ADMISSION—SESSION 1931-32.

College re-opens on 2nd July, 1931.

1. ADMISSIONS TO THE VARIOUS classes begin immediately after the publication of the Calcutta University results in the "Calcutta Gazette."

2. Candidates for admission should apply for the necessary admission forms, enclosing one anna postage stamps and stating whether they are old students of the College or candidates seeking admission for the first time. The appropriate forms will then be sent.

3. These forms, duly filled in, should be submitted as soon as possible after the publication of the University Examination results. They should be addressed to the Principal (not by name) and the word "Admission" should be written on the cover. Candidates for admission to the 1st Year Classes should submit their mark sheets along with these application forms.

4. Presidency College students who pass the Intermediate and Degree Examinations and desire re-admission should note that unless they apply in the proper form their claims to admission will not be recognised. Those who pass the Intermediate Examinations in the 2nd and 3rd divisions will have no priority of claim to re-admission to the College in the 3rd Year classes. The admission of I.Sc.'s into B.A. class will go by merit.

5. No correspondence relating to admission will be attended to, unless accompanied by postage stamps.
