SIR,

ADVERTING to Home Department Resolution No. ¹⁰ ₃₀₉, dated 23rd October 1884, I am directed to convey the following observations with reference to paragraph 11 thereof, which dealt with the recommendations of the Education Commission in the matter of the admission of children of all classes and castes to aided schools.

2. In the paragraph referred to, the desire of the Government of India was expressed that aided schools should be encouraged to admit all classes and castes, and that due provision should be made in all parts of the country for the education of low caste children. These two principles are still to be maintained; but in view of the great delicacy of the subject and of the difficulty of dealing therewith, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India desires that Local Governments shall not feel themselves bound by the absolute recommendations of the Commission (No. 8 of Chapter III and No. 25 of Chapter IV) as to the registration of "schools as special," but shall be left to deal with the matter in such way as may seem most appropriate in the particular circumstances of the people in the different parts of the country. The Governor General in Council, however, trusts that under judicious management prejudices of the nature referred to, which are felt by the managers of aided schools in some parts of India, will gradually lessen and eventually disappear.

3. I am to add that in Government Schools and Colleges the existing rule of admission irrespective of caste must of course be maintained.

TO THE PRINCIPALS OF COLLEGES.

Dated Darjeeling, the 18th June 1885.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to request that your budget estimates for the ensuing year (1886-87) may be submitted to this office at latest by the 1st August next.

2. As in former years, the college in its several departments should be shewn separately from the collegiate, branch, or survey schools, and only charges sanctioned by proper authority should be shewn. You should bear in mind, however, that all sanctioned charges are not to be entered in full, but only such portion of them as you think may be required during the year, any items that may be kept in abeyance being shewn in the column for remarks.

3. In form II attention should be paid to the progressive increase in the salaries of graded officers. The month from which the annual increment becomes due should be notified, and increment should be calculated up to the end of February only, as salaries for March become due in the following year.

4. In form I the amount entered in column 4 as "contributed from the Moshin Endowment Fund for Maulavis' salaries" should correspond with the amount entered in the column of "Remarks" in form II, in accordance with note (a) of that form.

5. In the case of funds consisting of endowments, the whole income of which is paid into the treasury for the benefit of particular colleges, the amount entered against the fund in forms V and VI should correspond with the amount entered against the school in form I, columns 6 and 7 (see note to form VI).

6. If any grant or expenditure is required, other than that already sanctioned, a supplementary budget may be submitted a short time after the regular budget, in the form prescribed by Government in circular No. 15 of 29th March 1880, forwarded to you with my circular No. 35, dated 1st July 1880, full explanations being given in a covering letter as to the necessity for the expenditure in question.

7. Details shewing how the contingent grant is expended should be given. Particular attention should be paid to this, as charges on account of servants, &c., are often shewn in lump sums, and not in detail, as required by standing orders.

8. The Government grant on account of hostels should be shewn in the budget. Fees realized on this account should not be entered to credit, since they do not pass through the treasury.

9. Be good enough to forward two separate statements in the annexed forms (V and VI), shewing the estimated receipts and expenditure of all trust funds connected with the college.

10. Three sets of five budget forms are herewith forwarded. They should be forwarded to this office in duplicate.
