In his Circular 33, dated 26th February 1895 the D. P. I. forwards a request that a complete Catalogue of books &c of each College Library should be made every five years. It is now 11 years since the last Catalogue of this Library was made. For several years past Mr Webb, formerly in charge of the Library, and after him myself have been engaged on the somewhat onerous & difficult work of correcting the old Catalogue, which abounded with errors of description and wrong entries of sorts. Our work has now nearly been completed by the present Librarian whose duties have been rendered doubly difficult by the defalcations & thefts occurring under his predecessor Kishory Nathon Mukherjee. He has made a new list of all the books, maps &c at present in the Library, and this is nearly ready for printing. The Library contains about 30,000 volumes & the task of Cataloguing these, especially considering the numerous errors in the old list, has been very heavy.

I beg to bring to your favourable notice
the excellent work done in this matter by
the present Librarian Jogendra Lal Singha.
The M. S. Catalogue, however, can hardly be
sent to press without another revision. The
Librarian, if he is to carry on his current
