Memorandum

The subject of the present

Physical Science for the last few years and later
 revised by the University Senate consists of
 Chemistry, Animal Physiology and Zoology
 Geography the Students selected for their studies
 being portions of Chambers' Elements, Miller's
 Solwases Zoology and various authors of
 Physical Geography respectively. It is
 respectfully requested the attention of the Senate to
 the fact that neither in the course that has
 down nor in the curriculum of natural philo-
 sophy has any provision been made for a
 part which as it appears to be, is a
 basis of any sound instruction in the Physical
 Sciences viz. the fundamental laws of mechanics
 acoustics. The Philosophy of the Inductive Sciences
 (probably as far back as 1719) has indeed been made a subject of examination
 for Candidates for Honors in the B.A. degree
 but as I believe few or some of the candidates
 have talents pre-eminently fitted for
 examination in this part, which would be
 a great loss to the College and to the
 system of instruction in Natural Science.
 It is concluded that the University has but
 little to show in the general training of the
 students.

 work of Sir John Herschel as a text book for
 that purpose. I think, however, it would
 be better my belief that the additional labor
 now imposed upon the students, and the full com-
 plemented by the aid, they will thus be given in
 the Special branches of Science
 Science which they will necessarily enter upon.
 It will impart much additional interest to the
 latter study, and enable them to be associated
 as greatly to facilitate their acquisition.

At the same time, I would respectfully
 submit to the Senate, the desirability of substituting
 some other work on Physical Geography
 for that of Mr. Hughes, now in use. I think
 this work contains much irrelevant matter and
 florid description, which does not become the
 student, is no purpose, but the method of treatment
 of scientific facts is so vague and its
 list of facts so numerous, that it can scarcely
 be said to deserve the name of a Scientific
 work. Sir John Herschel's treatise on the same
 subject, extracted from the Encyclopaedia Britannica
 is somewhat less comprehensive, but is
 in all other respects far more correct and
 a far superior book, and is at the same time
 written in the style of the student's Compendium.
 Sir James Hall's book is also in every respect
 better, but is too extensive and detailed for the
 student, it matters it in addition to the other sub-
 jects of their study.

From the RIGHT HON'BLE SIR CHARLES WOOD, *Bart.*, M. P. and G. C. S., Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India, to His Excellency the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council,—(No. 3, dated London, the 16th March 1863.)

MY LORD,

I HAVE considered in Council your letter dated 20th December (No. 11) 1862, furnishing, with reference to my Despatch of the 17th June last, No. 10, a Report from the Director of Public Instruction in Bengal, as to the qualifications desired in gentlemen hereafter to be selected for the Educational Service in Bengal, and the salary to be secured to the gentlemen appointed to the Service in anticipation of vacancies in particular appointments.

2. I concur in the opinion that an allowance of Rupees 250 per mensem is inadequate, under present circumstances, to induce individuals, qualified for the higher offices in the Department, to enter the Educational Service in Bengal. It seems inadvisable, however, to assign to gentlemen, holding no specific appointments, salaries equal to those attached to appointments to which they may hereafter be appointed; and as it appears from the result of Mr. Atkinson's inquiries at Oxford and Cambridge that a minimum salary of Rupees 400 per mensem, on first entering the Department, would be sufficient to secure the services of highly qualified persons, I am of opinion that the salary to be assigned to gentlemen, appointed in anticipation of vacancies in particular Offices, should be fixed at the amount.

3. I think, however, that, as a general rule, appointments should not be made to the Educational Department in Bengal, except in view to the supplying of particular appointments in which there is a prospect of an early vacancy. In order that this view may be acted upon, and that while a due supply of well qualified agents is secured to the Educational Department, a proper check may be maintained on the recommendations of the Director, a Statement should be prepared of the several appointments in the Bengal Educational Department which ought to be filled by Europeans, and that the requisitions of the Government of Bengal, for the engagement of gentlemen in this country, should be limited to such as may be necessary for supplying vacancies expected to occur in the Offices included in such authorized Statement.

4. It would, of course, be competent, at any time, for the Lieutenant-Governor to apply for the services of individuals, in exception to this general rule; but specific grounds should, in such cases, be stated, and no general statements of the wants of the Department would be considered a sufficient reason for proposing an appointment.

 of students, Europeans and some of the students
 present at each lecture on the subject of geology
 lately delivered by me at the Museum of the
 Museum - also in accordance with the instructions

 the following report on the general result of the
 lectures, and the expediency of any alterations
 that may be made in the course to be given in future
 years.

The results of the course lately given
 have I regret to say been by no means such
 as I had hoped for. As will be seen by the
 attached report of attendance, the audience
 has been very unequal at each lecture,
 and although it comprised for the most part
 persons of scientific pursuits, and therefore
 capable of appreciating the subjects brought
 before them, and that there were very regular
 in their attendance, sometimes to their natural

In consequence, I cannot consider that the amount of good done has been commensurate with the additional labor which the lectures have imposed upon me, and which has been equal to that of my entire Presidency College duties for the term being - except indeed that the lectures were prepared in the form of notes, and not written in extempore, the work has been equal to that of writing a work on geology addressed to an Indian public.

This want of success I consider may be attributed partly to the novelty of the experiment, partly also ^{to the} imperfections of the experiment. I have heard from several persons of their inability to attend, may be taken as a criterion) to the hour (12 p.m.) being such, that only those few who can leave their offices exactly at the nominal closing hour, are able to attend, but chiefly to the demand for scientific information of a systematic character being less than had been anticipated a priori. By the numerous junior officers of the Civil and Military services resident in Calcutta, but no gentleman attended. Seeing that these gentlemen are for the most part men of superior education and that they are less closely restricted in time and place by official engagements than most other residents of Calcutta, I confessed myself surprised for a somewhat larger number of their body -

a-*in* accp. although my own labors have been
 unremunerated, and that no expense has been
 incurred for the use of rooms, or for specimens
 I have been obliged to expend on my own res-
 ponsibility about 250*Rs* for diagrams, for which
 sum no provision has been made, unless indeed
 I am permitted to reimburse myself out of the
 sum lately granted by his His Honor for pro-
 viding the President's *College* with a diagram
 and apparatus for the *College* as however the requirements
 of the college are such that the alienation of any
 part of that sum will cause serious incon-
 venience. I trust that some other provision may
 be made for the expenses of the Geological *Course*.
 In my former Memo. dated 20 January I
 recommended that the lecturers be devoted
 to this purpose, but I believe they have not
 amounted to more than 100*Rs*, so that they are
 insufficient to cover the expenditure incurred
 and which has only enabled me after all to
 provide a very inadequate series of Diagrams
 indeed had I not been able to avail myself
 of a small series of my own, and of a series of
 pictorial diagrams the private property
 (as I understand) of Mr. Oldham, which that
 gentleman very kindly placed at my disposal,
 my diagrams must have been far *less* intelligible
 than they actually were. I would request therefore
 that a sum of 250*Rs* be sanctioned to meet the
 above expenditure.

5. It may be such having been the result of the
 present experimental *Course* I am enabled

providing tools repetition in future years under
the present arrangements with any great hope of
useful results. It is His Honor's desire that
in future the lectures be delivered in some
building in the vicinity of the native town
so that a larger number of Antient gentlemen
and students may be induced to attend. I
shall of course be prepared to repeat the lectures
any place which His Honor may decide upon
but seeing the present impracticability of
illustrating geological lectures elsewhere
than either at the Asiatic Society's Rooms
or the Geological Museum, and seeing also
that an audience unprepared by previous
training in the fundamental and simpler
sciences (Physics, Chemistry, Biological
science &c) is utterly unfitted to comprehend
so complex and all-embracing a science
as geology. I cannot think that any greater
success can be expected than that which has
attended the present experimental course -

I am far from thinking however
that the ill success of the present experiment
is to be taken as indicating the impracticability
of imparting a certain amount of scientific
information to the public, but I am of opinion
that in order to obtain any success a different
class of lectures must be delivered and that
an expenditure must be incurred for
which no present provision has been made -

It may also be permitted to think
that any scheme which I contemplate

would entail a very large amount of additional
labour on myself equivalent indeed to doubling
my duties at the Presidency College -

& Under these circumstances I feel
that it would not be relevant to enter further
into this subject at present, but should I at
any time be called upon by His Honor to
submit a Memorandum on the subject of
Public Instruction in Science, I shall be
fully prepared to do so -

RESOLUTION.—SOME doubts having been expressed as to the principle upon which the Military Budget Estimate of 1863-64 should be prepared, His Honor the President in Council resolves to remove them authoritatively.

2. It is, in the opinion of His Honor, advisable, *under all circumstances*, to exhibit the *whole* of the expenditure "coming in course of payment within the year 1863-64" on the face of the Estimates. The unexpended portion of the existing grants will therefore lapse on 30th April 1863, and all charges coming in course of payment within the year ending 30th April 1864 will be provided for in the Budget Estimates of 1863-64, now preparing, without reference to the year in which they may have been incurred.

ORDERED, that a copy of the above Resolution be sent to the Military Finance Department, and to the Auditor-General of India.

IN reply to your letter No. 5, dated 2nd instant, which was received in this Office on the 4th idem, in which you enquire whether "the unexpended balances of grants for Civil Expenditure for 1862-63 should be held to have lapsed on the 30th ultimo," I am directed to instruct you that the Resolution No. 909, issued from this Department on the 14th March last, is to be strictly observed. All Revenues and Receipts which come under the Budget classification will appear as income of the year in which they are received, and all expenditure coming under the Budget classification will appear as charges of the year in which they come in course of payment.

2. The foregoing refers equally to Civil and Military Receipts and Expenditure. In point of fact any distinction between arrear and current Receipts and Charges is, as regards the Financial Accounts of the year 1863-64, useless, although it may be continued for a time as useful statistical information valuable to this Office as a means of checking the Estimates; but even this will cease after a year or two.

3. All balances of grants for Civil or Military purposes remaining unexpended on the 30th ultimo must, therefore, be considered to have lapsed.

4. It must be understood, however, that the grant out of the Income Tax Receipts to Public Works, which amounts to thirty-eight lacs, will be debited as a charge against Revenue, and be credited to "Debt" intact.

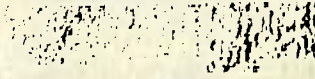

SIR,

A reference having been made to Government on appeals from certain officers of the Education Department against the orders of the Supreme Government (Financial Department No. 665 G., dated 30th September, 1862), by which it is ruled that Masters of "Aided" Schools are not entitled to pensionary support out of the Public Revenues, it has been decided that in the case of Masters formerly attached to Government Schools who were "induced to accept employment in the private Aided Schools in the belief that their eligibility to pension from Government would continue," the option should be given them "of resuming employment in Government Schools with the understanding that if they accept it, their service in the Aided Schools should be allowed to count towards pension for a period not exceeding three years."

I have accordingly to request that you will prepare and submit to me with as little delay as possible, a return of all the teachers in the College and Schools under your control, whose claims to pension have been affected by quitting Government Service for service in Aided Schools between the 2nd December, 1862, when this office was put in possession of the despatch* of the late Honorable Court of Directors on which the eligibility to pension of Masters in Aided Schools was founded; and the 19th February, 1863, the date of promulgation to the Education Department of the resolution of the Government of India declaring that the construction put upon that despatch was erroneous and disallowing the claims of such Masters to any pensionary support from Government.

In this return you will note the appointment held by each Master at the time he quitted Government Service, and the appointment or appointments continuously held by him from that time to the present.

READ an Endorsement from the Foreign Department No. 124, dated the 11th March 1864, forwarding an application from the Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces for the grant of half pay to the Customs Chupprassies when sick *in Hospital* for any period not exceeding six months, and recommending that the measure may be sanctioned experimentally for one year, subject to report at the end of that period.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased, under the circumstances stated, to sanction the proposed measure, subject to report after one year.

ORDERED, that a copy of the above Resolution, and of the letter from the Chief Commissioner, Central Provinces, be sent to the Foreign Department for information and for the issue of the necessary orders.

Ordered also, that a copy of the Resolution be sent to the Civil Pay-Master, North-Western Provinces, and the Deputy Auditor and Accountant-General, Central Provinces, for information and guidance.

Ordered further, that a copy of the Resolution, and of the letter from the Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces, be forwarded to the several Local Governments and Administrations, with a remark that His Excellency the Governor General in Council approves of the extension of the above indulgence throughout India, as an experimental measure, to all Chupprassies when sick *in Hospital*.

From CAPTAIN H. MACKENZIE, Secretary to the Chief Commissioner, Central Provinces, to COLONEL H. M. DURAND, C. B., Secretary to the Government of India, Foreign Department,—(No. 510 dated the 23rd February 1864.)

I AM directed by the Chief Commissioner to submit copy of letter, No. 3 of the 4th current, from the Commissioner of Customs, North-Western Provinces, with enclosures, submitting a proposal to allow Customs Chupprassies while in Hospital half pay, for the consideration and orders of His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General in Council.

2. It would appear that when Customs Chupprassies are in Hospital substitutes are entertained, and these latter necessarily draw the full pay of the sick men. Without special sanction, therefore, there is nothing available for the sick men.

3. The measure now proposed of allowing half pay while in Hospital for any time not exceeding six months, on the Certificate of the Civil Surgeon that detention in Hospital is absolutely necessary, seems judicious as well as considerate, and likely to tend to the improvement of the Department; and the Chief Commissioner accordingly ventures to hope that His Excellency may be pleased to accord his sanction thereto.

4. The Commissioner of Customs suggests that this half pay may be met from savings, and no doubt the amount of saving would cover the charge. But, as it would be difficult to check the charges as they occur by savings actually accrued, I am to suggest that it would be more convenient and answer all purposes to accord sanction to the disbursement of half pay without insisting on its having any direct or immediate connection with the savings.

From the Commissioner of Customs, North-Western Provinces, to the Secretary to the Chief Commissioner, Central Provinces,—(No. 3, dated the 4th February 1864.)

I HAVE the honor to submit the accompanying copy of a letter No. 9, dated 25th ultimo, with its enclosure, from the Collector of Customs at Saugor.

2. From Dr. Rice's Report it certainly appears ~~inhuman~~, unjust, to refuse any support to Chupprassies of this Department ~~temporarily~~ prostrated by sickness contracted while in the performance of their duty.

3. There cannot be many instances of the nature described by Dr. Rice; but I would beg to propose, for the favorable considerations of higher Authority, that, in all such cases, the patient receive half his pay for any time not exceeding six months that the Civil Surgeon may consider his detention in Hospital absolutely necessary.

4. This arrangement will not put Government to more expense than what has been sanctioned for the Establishment, and at the same time its efficiency will remain unimpaired. The half salary proposed for the sick Chupprassy whose whole pay will go towards his substitute will be disbursed from the amount monthly saved and hitherto carried to the credit of Government by temporary vacancies among Jemadars and Chupprassies, &c.

From the Collector of Customs, Saugor, to the Commissioner of Customs, North-Western Provinces,—(No. 9, dated the 25th January 1864.)

I HAVE the honor to submit, in original, a Docket, dated 22nd instant, from the Civil Assistant Surgeon, Saugor, and request to be informed whether the men of the Customs Establishment are entitled to a portion of their pay whilst in the Civil Hospital.

From the Civil Assistant Surgeon, Saugor, to the Collector of Customs, Saugor,—(dated the 22nd January 1864.)

REPORTS that a Chupprassy of the Customs Establishment in the city was brought to Hospital in a dying state last night, and died during the night. On *post mortem* examination inflammation of the lungs was the cause; he had been ill for several days and dreaded coming to Hospital as his pay would be stopped.

There is a man now in Hospital for paralysis: his leave will expire in three days, and he says he must leave the Hospital or starve; his sickness was contracted while on sentry duty; and for the week that he has been in he has improved wonderfully.

The Customs Department is alone of all the Government Establishments in refusing medical aid in Hospital to its servants. Those of the Saugor part of the line are worse off in this respect than the men at Deorie and Malhonoré, who have peripatetic Native Doctors, such as they are, to visit them every third or fourth day.

Some arrangement should be made, for humanity's sake alone, to assimilate the Customs with the Police Department with regard to medical aid in Hospital.

The men say if they were allowed an anna a day for their food they would gladly accept it rather than die of disease or become cripples all their lives.

SIR,

I beg to recommend that a lower course of Sanscrit than that recommended by the majority of the sub-committee be prescribed for the First Arts and B. A. Examinations on the following grounds.

(1.) The Calcutta University requires a "competent knowledge" of every subject laid down for the examination and deficiency in one subject cannot be compensated for by high proficiency in another.

(2.) Every student who attempts to pass the First Examination in Arts must therefore study Sanscrit for at least five years in order to pass in that subject.

(3.) Several schools in lower Bengal that now train students for the University Entrance will not teach their students Sanscrit, either because of the expense, or because the managers think it right to teach the pupils their mother-tongue before recourse is had to its classic original.

(4.) Every student that takes up Bengali at the Entrance Examination without also knowing Sanscrit will be plucked at the First Arts, since the time necessarily devoted in College to the study of History, Mathematics, Mental Philosophy and the English Language will leave a remainder of time too small to make up deficiency in Sanscrit. I therefore recommend that the Sanscrit standard now proposed for the Entrance be made for a few years the standard for First Arts and the standard for the First Arts that for the B. A. degree.

If this proposal be rejected, I recommend for consideration the amendment that failure in one subject shall not exclude candidates, otherwise well prepared, from passing an Examination.

The Architect to the Government of Bengal has also been directed to prepare the Design for the University, as required by the Government of India.
