Most respectfully sheweth.

That your Petitioner after obtaining his degree at the Universities of Cambridge and London, was on his return to India, appointed to the graded Educational Service, and since the 7th of January, 1885, the date of his appointment, has held the post of Professor of Physical Science in the Presidency College.

2. That your Petitioner has in addition to his other duties, been entrusted with the work ^{of reorganising} ~~the Physical Laboratory~~ ^{of the Presidency College} ~~and~~ ^{in connection with} your Petitioner ventures to hope that he has been able to raise it to a state of efficiency ^{with a comparatively small outlay from the Government}. Several investigations involving Original Research having been carried out to successful issue; one of these has recently been communicated by Lord Rayleigh to the Royal Society.

3. That your Petitioner in order to carry on these researches ^{as he has no other} had to incur a very large expenditure, which he paid with difficulty ^{from his limited income} from the Royal

4. That your Petitioner, owing to the rapid progress that is daily being made in Physical Science, finds it difficult to keep the Laboratory abreast with the state of modern Science, unless he has frequent opportunities of visiting the European Laboratories. This your Petitioner is unable to undertake on his present small pay.

That Your Petitioner had already to incur a large expenditure for the education he received in England, and in qualifying himself for his degrees of M.A and B.Sc. in two of the most expensive universities. The additional expenditure which he is now obliged to incur for the continuation of his researches in buying costly apparatus, valuable scientific works and journals, ^{paying subscription to Scientific Society} has proved to be beyond his means and Your Petitioner feels that he may be unable to devote his whole time and energies to the prosecution of his scientific pursuits if he is liable to be distracted by ^{financial} ~~pecuniary~~ difficulties.

That your Petitioner being a native of India has one third of his pay deducted by the operation of what is known as the two-thirds rule. That Your Petitioner has reason to believe that in his despatch on the reorganisation of the Geological Survey of India, No 56, Revenue dated the 4th May 93, was pleased to say that "the policy of recent decisions has been that in accordance with the recommendation of the Public Service Commission pay shall be granted on independent grounds without reference to race" in accordance with the principle the Secretary of State was pleased to cancel the two-thirds rule in the Geological Survey, and allow Mr P.N. who was appointed on two-thirds pay, the full pay of his grade.

That your Petitioner begs that a similar concession may be made in his case with retrospective effect and your Petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray.

A municipal debenture and a Calcutta Port Trust debenture of Rs. 100 each were accordingly purchased and placed in the custody of the Comptroller-General for the purpose.

2. The accounts of the fund for the period from 1st April 1895 (the date from which the fund started) to 30th September 1895 have been audited by the local auditor under my supervision.

3. The cash-book closed with an invested capital of Rs. 200 in the custody of the Comptroller-General, and a balance of Rs. 8-4 in the Savings Bank, as per pass-book.

In reply to your letter dated the 28th of Nov. 1895 asking for details of expenditure of the club for the last year, I have the honour to inform you that the necessary details are to be found in the account-book of the club forwarded with this letter.

The way in which I mean to expend the Govt grant asked for, and the sum raised by ourselves, will be evident from the Appendix attached to this letter.

I beg to inform ^{you} that ~~we have not raised~~ the sum of Rs 800 has not been raised locally this year.

This year we have collected Rs 228 among ourselves, ^{and} with the Govt grant asked for of ~~the~~ a sum of Rs 100 expected from the professors of the College, ~~which~~ would come to, in round numbers, a total of 550 Rs. only.

That last year 800 Rs were raised is due to the fact that H. H. the Maharaja of Cochin Bekar was kind enough to send a donation of 250 Rs to the Club, covering the price of a tent.

I beg therefore to state that both the expenditure and receipts of the past year were abnormal—

That the Govt grant of Rs 228 only is absolutely necessary is proved by the following considerations which I hope you will be good enough to take into account.

- (a) That of the liability of Rs 60 with which the Club started last year only Rs 30 have been paid off.
- (b) That at the present moment the ~~it is~~ the expenses of the club are being carried on by the money kindly advanced by the Honorary Secy of the Club
- (c) That we expect the expenses of the Current year to be greater than that of the past year owing to an increased value of sporting gear, probably due to the present state of exchange—

TEXT-BOOKS IN MIDDLE SCHOOLS.

THE subjoined list of text-books, authorised for use in middle schools of which the vernacular is Bengali, is published for general information, corrected up to date.

Middle schools of every class, whether maintained or aided by Government, by District Boards, or by Municipalities, or competing for Government scholarships, are restricted to the use of the books included in this list.

Managers of schools will be at liberty to choose out of the list any books that they may prefer for use in the various classes of their schools, subject only to the following conditions:—

- (a) The text-books prescribed by this office for the middle scholarship examinations must be read in the first classes of middle schools.
- (b) The separate orders prescribing special text-books in sanitary teaching for the different scholarship examinations are still in force.

With these exceptions, the selection of text-books from the authorised list, in every subject of every class, is henceforward left to the unrestricted choice of school managers.

A book approved for any class may, with the approval of the Circle Inspector, be used in the next higher or lower class.

For those subjects in which the two courses correspond, text-books for the first two classes of upper primary schools may be selected from those sanctioned in the list for the third and fourth classes of middle schools.

If the heads of offices and firms are good enough to comply with this request, there can be, so far as their establishments are concerned, no dissatisfaction found with the Jury List on the ground of its containing the names of persons who are not qualified or liable to serve as Jurors.

A provisional list will be published in the *Calcutta Gazette* on or about the 15th of April next, and any mistakes or omissions contained in it will be corrected and supplied in the revised and final list published in the *Gazette* following.

After that date no alterations can be made in the Jury List until the following year.

All claims for general exemption from service, on the ground of permanent illness, or otherwise, should be made known to me before the list is made up and published. No claims on the score of illness can be regarded unless they are supported by the certificate of some properly qualified medical man.

It is particularly requested that the lists here asked for may be sent in to my office at the earliest opportunity, and not later than the 15th of March next.

JURY RULES.

III. Every male person between the ages of twenty-one and sixty, who is not the subject of any Foreign State, and who resides or personally works for gain within the local limits of the High Court in its Ordinary Original Criminal Jurisdiction, shall be qualified and liable, subject to the provisos and conditions hereinafter contained to serve as a Juror at any Criminal Sittings of the High Court, other than sittings held under the provisions of Section 335 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1882, and upon any inquest before the Coroner of Calcutta; provided he be the resident occupier of a house within the said local limits of the annual value of not less than four hundred rupees; or has property, or an interest in lands, tenements, or goods within the Province of Bengal of the value of not less than three thousand rupees; or is in receipt of an income of not less than one hundred rupees a month.

America is not, "a Foreign State" within the meaning of this rule.

"Annual value" in this rule means annual value as defined by Section 122 of the Calcutta Municipal Consolidation Act, 1888.

IV. No person shall be eligible to serve as a Juror as aforesaid, who holds any office in or under the High Court; or who receives any pay or emolument for any employment in any office or under any officer thereof; or for executing any duties of Police; or who is the subject of any Foreign State; or who is under the age of twenty-one years; or who having been convicted of a non-bailable offence under the Indian Penal Code, or of a similar offence in British India or elsewhere, shall not have obtained a free pardon in respect thereof, or have obtained a reversal of such conviction upon the merits; or who is a lunatic or an idiot; or who does not understand English when spoken.

V. The following persons are exempted from liability to serve on Juries, and shall not be put upon the list of Jurors, *viz.* :—

10. Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marine.
11. Advocates, Vakeels, and Attorneys of the High Court in actual practice, and Managing Clerks to Attorneys.
12. Clergymen of the Church of England and persons actually employed as ministers of any religious worship whatsoever, and not engaged in any secular employment, except that of teaching.
13. The Comptroller General of Accounts of the Government of India.
14. The Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary to the Justices of the Peace, and the Health Officer.

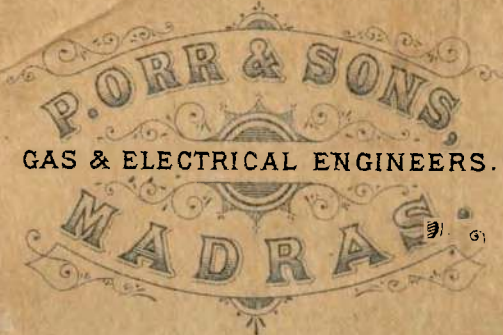

A NOTE ON BENGALI GRAMMAR.

I. Bengali Grammar is to be understood as the art of speaking and writing the Bengali language correctly.

II. A minute and elaborate classification of letters such as ঘোষ, মহাঘোষ, বাদ, বিবাদ, সঙ্গাদ, &c., should be avoided. There is no objection, however, to make a distinction between অসদ্বর্ণ and মহাঅসদ্বর্ণ letters. The vowels should be classified as long and short, and the prolation of vowels should be omitted. The name অব্যয়বাহ should be omitted, অনুস্বার and বিসর্গ being considered as স্বরবর্ণ according to some and ব্যঞ্জনবর্ণ according to others.

III. Rules showing the different parts of the mouth from which different letters are pronounced should avoid such complex forms as কণ্ঠগাত and দন্ত্যাদি।

IV. All attempts to give rules for the various pronunciations of the same letters should be avoided in an elementary work on Grammar. Boys are to learn this from practice.

V. Rules of সন্ধি relating to forms which either do not occur or but rarely occur in Bengali should be avoided.

VI. Detailed rules as to the use of য and ঞ should be avoided.

VII. The classification of শব্দ as অব্যয় and সব্যয় should be omitted. The word সব্যয় is a new coinage and is misleading.

VIII. A minute and elaborate classification of parts of speech such as classification of nouns into common, proper, &c., and the classification of adjectives into বিশেষণীয় বিশেষণ, &c., should be avoided.

IX. The distinction between কারক and বিভক্তি should be kept up.

X. Declensions should be taught more by paradigms than by elaborate rules.

XI. Some grammarians are in the habit of giving the pronominal bases of the first and the second person উক্ত and মধ্যম পুরুষ as অস্মদ and বৃহস্পদ। The propriety of this is doubtful.

XII. Detailed rules of inflection such as (১) প্রায় সমস্ত স্বত্ববাচক শব্দ (২) এবং দার, অক্ষত ও লাজ শব্দ পুংলিঙ্গ should be avoided.

XIII. Minute and elaborate rules for *samas* should be avoided.

XIV. There is no necessity for framing rules in a Bengali grammar of একদেশী সমাস, প্রাদ সমাস, নিত্য সমাস, উপমিত সমাস, রূপক সমাস, &c., but in কর্মধারয় সমাস like মুখচন্দ্র বিপ্রবন্ধি, the meaning should be explained as মুখ ই চন্দ্র বা চন্দ্রের ন্যায় মুখ, the 1st called রূপক and the 2nd উপমিত সমাস।

XV. In lieu of rules for the formation of irregular *samas*, compounds such as ময়ূরবাংসক, a list of such words in common use as আকঙ্কন, অকুতোভয়, অর্থাভর, দেশান্তর, তনাত্র, যদিচ্ছা, মহারাজ, কাপুরুষ, গোষ্ঠ, গোপদ, হরিশ্চন্দ্র, আশ্চর্য, &c., should be given, with a bare statement that they are irregularly formed (নিপাতনে সিদ্ধ)।

XVI. The classification of ক্রিয়া বিভক্তি or verbal inflectional terminations is undesirable.

XVII. The general rules of ক্রদন্ত and উবাদি only should be given, detailed rules should be avoided, but the words in common use not covered by general rules should be given in a নিপাতন list.

That the final decision concerning books on Bengali Grammar now on the authorised list be postponed for six months from the date of publication in the *Education Gazette* and the *Calcutta Gazette* of the revised note on Bengali Grammar, and that copies of the note be sent to the authors or publishers of Bengali Grammars on the authorised list to guide them in the revision of their works in accordance therewith.

(3) Read the President's note on the selection of text-books.

Resolved—That the consideration of it be postponed until after the publication of the collection of rules, &c., relating to the powers and functions of the Committee, and that the Secretary be requested to expedite the same.

(4) Read Director of Public Instruction's letter No. 6848, dated the 9th March 1896, regarding the publication of Babu Brajamohon Datta's prize essay.

Resolved—That the Director of Public Instruction be informed that the Committee have not come to any definite resolution upon the question whether these essays should or should not be printed; that their last resolution passed at the meeting of the 15th June 1895 was—

“That a letter be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, enquiring whether there are funds at his disposal for the publication of the last prize essay;”

that as no provision is made by the donor for printing the essays, and as the Director of Public Instruction doubts the propriety of the essays being printed from Government funds, it is unnecessary to consider the matter any further.

(5) Read letter No. 1561, dated the 5th March 1896, from the Director of Public Instruction, forwarding for report and return a petition of Babu Mathura Nath Barma regarding “English compositions in Bengali”

Resolved—That the Director of Public Instruction be requested to favour the Committee with a copy of the Resolution, if any, referred to in the first paragraph of the letter of Babu Mathura Nath Barma.

(6) Read the reports of the Revision Sub-Committee on the books named below. After some discussion regarding each book brought up, the following opinions were recorded :—
