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FOREWORD

No apology is needed for the publication of a History and Register of the Krishnagar College in the year of its Centenary. The College was formally opened on the 1st January 1846. It then consisted of an English Department and a School Department. The English Department was the real College department and consisted of about half a dozen students. How it has grown in the course of a century will be found in the History compiled from the College records by Professor T. N. Talukdar.

Certain earlier proposals about the starting of a College at Nadia can be traced to Lord Minto's Minutes and the Fisher's Memoirs and it is quite clear that the original proposal was for starting a Sanskrit College (*i.e.*, a College for Oriental Learning) and not a college for western education at Nadia. A brief resume of the earlier proposals is given below:—

Lord Minto in a Minute, dated the 6th March 1811, recorded that "in addition to the College at Benares, colleges be established at Nuddea and at Bhour in the district of Trihoot." In the Memoir originally compiled in 1827 from the records at the East India House by Thomas Fisher, Searcher of the Records, we find the following remarks:—

"The establishment of colleges at Nadia and Tirhoot was proposed by Lord Minto in 1811. A Committee was formed in Nadia to carry out the plan but nothing was done until 1816, when the Committee reported on the state of education in Nadia. There were 46 schools with about 380 students, their ages averaging between 25 and 35 years. Government made further enquiries but no reply appears to have been received by 1821. At Tirhoot also a Committee was appointed to carry out the idea but nothing had been done by 1821. In that year (1821) the design of founding colleges at Nadia and Tirhoot was finally abandoned."

In 1832, Thomas Fisher added a supplement to his Memoir which was published as Minutes of Evidence taken before the Select Committee of the House of Commons on the Affairs of the East India Company (February to July 1832). The supplement contained the following further information about education in Nadia:—

"Nadia contains about 25 *tols* (schools of oriental learning). The instruction is free. The Pandits receive funds from former grants of the Raja of Nadia and presents from zamindars. The students are full-grown men; the usual number in a *tol* is about 20 to 25, but there may be in some 50 to 60. The total number of students is said to be from 500 to 600, some from remote parts of India. The chief study is Nyaya or Logie."

Shortly after this period, *i.e.*, in 1835, Macaulay penned his famous Minute on Education which led to a great deal of controversy regarding the fate of oriental education in India.

The controversy was set at rest by Lord William Bentinck's Resolution of March 1835, which laid down that all funds which would be left after making certain improvements in regard to schools of oriental learning should "henceforth be employed in imparting to the native population a

knowledge of English literature and science through the medium of the English language; and His Lordship in Council requests the Committee to submit to Government, with all expedition, a plan for the accomplishment of this purpose."

The Council of Education, appointed in terms of Lord William Bentinck's Resolution, explored the possibilities of starting colleges and schools in various zones in consultation with the Local Committees formed for the purpose. One such Committee was found for starting a College at Krishnagar, and a public meeting was held in the town on the 18th November 1845, for the purpose of raising funds for construction of the College building. A report of the public meeting held at Krishnagar on the 18th November 1845, appeared in the well known contemporary paper the *Friend of India* (27th November 1845, page 754) which was later on incorporated with the *Statesman*. During the time of Lord Hardinge's Government the Local Committee formulated a scheme and after obtaining general approval of the Council of Education met on December 6, 1845, to submit detailed proposals to Government about appointment of Staff other than the Principal and the renting of a house for use of the College with effect from the 1st January 1846. The minutes of the first meeting held on the 6th December 1845, shortly after the appointment of Captain D. L. Richardson as Principal of the College and Secretary to the Local Committee, record that the Committee "recommended to Government that nothing should be charged to the students for use of their class books during the first year from the opening of the College." The recommendation met the usual fate in the hands of those who controlled the finances of the province a century ago, namely, the proposal was turned down by Government. All other proposals made by the Committee and accepted by the then Government of Bengal have been incorporated in the History of the College now placed before the public.

The Register of Old Students has been compiled by Professor Nirmal Kanti Majumdar, M.A., and in his preface to the Register he has given an account of the materials which he had used or consulted. He has taken a lot of trouble and devoted a considerable part of his time in ransacking old records. On behalf of all those who are interested in the welfare of the Krishnagar College I offer to Professors Tarak Nath Talukdar and Nirmal Kanti Majumdar our heartfelt thanks for their able compilations.

The University of Calcutta came into existence eleven years after the starting of the Krishnagar College. The College was therefore affiliated to the University from the very first year of its existence. The College is proud of its long connection with the University and the following message of the Syndicate of the University received on the occasion of the Centenary of the College in January, 1946, deserves a place in its History:—

"The University of Calcutta offers its most cordial greetings and felicitations to the Krishnagar College on the occasion of its Centenary Celebration. The University recalls with pleasure and gratification the great role which the College has played in the advancement of learning in the province, through its eminent Principals and teachers of whom Capt. D. L. Richardson was the first and also

through its alumni among whom are some of the famous sons of Bengal. The University hopes and trusts that the noble efforts of the College for the advancement of learning will be crowned with ever-increasing success as they have been in the past."

Like the histories of two other Government Colleges, viz., the Presidency College and the Hooghly College which celebrated their centenaries during the last two decades, *the History and the Register of the Krishnagar College* are being published by the Bengal Government Press. On behalf of all my colleagues I offer to the Director of Public Instruction, Bengal, our best thanks for getting the volume published through the Government Press inspite of many difficulties of the present times. "A centenary comes once in a hundred years" is perhaps a sufficient justification for getting the volume published in 1946.

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PREFACE

It is but fitting that Krishnagar College in the year of its Centenary should bring out a history of the institution with its one hundred years of chequered career. Though it is not the only history of its kind and Presidency and Hooghly College have already led the way in this sphere—the publication of the records of Krishnagar College in the form of a history will—we hope—be not without some additional value to every student of the social and educational history of Bengal in the last century. Moreover a study of the achievements of Krishnagar College with its noble edifice, its beautiful surroundings, its spacious grounds and rich tradition, should be a source of inspiration and pride to both its old and present students.

Our College is fortunate in having a complete series of records which may be classified as “Published” and “Unpublished”. The Unpublished records fall mainly into four classes: *First*, there are the copies of letters issued from the College mainly to the Controlling Educational authority which was the “Local Committee” up to June 1848, then “The Council of Education” from June 1848 till January 1855 and finally the Director of Public Instruction. These letters are full and exhaustive from the end of 1845 up to April 1879 and are available in the Krishnagar College Office in a set of neatly bound Manuscript volumes written in the most beautiful characters. Unfortunately they have not been available for the subsequent periods except for some years (from 1890—1908) and I have had to fall back on other sources like the “Annual General Reports on Public Instruction.” *Secondly*, there are some letters received from the Educational authorities like the Under-Secretary to the Government of Bengal written in 1845-1846 and the very interesting “Reports of the Local Committee” which are available in detail in neatly bound volumes for particular periods—such as those from 1845—1848 and again from 1855—1865. *Thirdly*, there are the “Miscellaneous Correspondence Files” of letters sent to or received from District Magistrates, Chairman of the Krishnagar Municipality, the Public Works Department, the Accountant-General and the University. These are available in bound volumes from 1889—1908. Though written in rather a slipshod manner, they throw some light on the working of the College in this period and contain also a large number of letters written by the Principal to the Director of Public Instruction. *Lastly*, there are the “Statistical Accounts” containing statements of income and expenditure of the College—which were generally appended to the Annual Reports of the College forwarded by the Principal to the Director.

Among the Printed Records, the most useful are the following: *First* in importance are “The Annual General Reports on Public Instruction” published by the “Council of Education” and the Director (of which Krishnagar College library has a complete series) now rescued from dust and decay by the Principal J. M. Sen and carefully kept in his own office room. *Secondly*, there is an earlier history of the College (a manuscript copy which was not published) written by Babu Bhabesh Chandra Banerjee, *ex-Principal of Krishnagar College*, and kindly lent by him for our use. As a skeleton-history, it has been of help to me in the preparation of this work and I am indebted to him for some of the statements made in the text.

Thirdly, there are the "Annual and Quinquennial Reports" of the College prepared by different Principals—which are available in a series of printed editions from 1907 to 1942. Then there is "the Krishnagar College Magazine" which becomes not only an important and continuous source of information from July 1915 until 1942 but throws additional light upon the corporate life of its students and their aspirations. For the last few years, the College Magazine has gone out of print owing to paper scarcity and financial stringency as a consequence of the War. Lastly, there are some old books available in the College Library which throw an interesting light on the life and history of the College from time to time, such as—

It is to be regretted that I could not utilise any materials outside Krishnagar owing to difficulties created by the War. But I have tried to sift carefully all the materials at my disposal and present a connected and reliable history of the College as far as it lay in my power. The *References* for statements made in the text have been generally indicated in the footnotes. I only hope that this history, inspite of its many short-comings, will not be found too unworthy of the College it commemorates. It is my humble gift of love to Krishnagar College which I have served as a teacher for the last fifteen years.

In the end, I should like to express my grateful thanks to our Principal J. M. Sen, M.Ed. (Leeds), who has gone through the whole manuscript carefully and made many useful suggestions and also to my colleague, Professor C. H. Chakravarti, who put me in touch with some new materials when I was preparing this history. Finally I must acknowledge my indebtedness to the beautifully written History of the Hooghly College by Principal K. Zachariah, M.A. (Oxon), not only for my references in the text but also for serving as a model in the preparation of this history. We are particularly grateful to Mr. A. K. Chanda, M.A. (Oxon), I.E.S., our present Director of Public Instruction, for without his kind sanction this work could not have been published.

CHAPTER I.

"Foundation of the College."

Krishnagar College, which was officially opened on the 1st of January 1846, was one of the later products of Western Education to which an impetus had been given by Lord William Bentinck in 1835 when, in the controversy between Anglicists and Orientalists, he decided that the object of the British Government should be the promotion of English Literature and Science. This decision was responsible for the rise of a number of institutions for higher education between 1835-1836—Medical College in 1835, Patna College in the same year, Hughli and Dacca Colleges (1836). The ten years that followed were marked by further development of Western Education on the plan initiated by Bentinck and Macaulay. Emphasis was laid rather on higher than on popular education which Macaulay stressed in his minutes of February 1835 in these words—"it is impossible for us with our limited means to attempt to educate the body of the people. We must do our best to form a class who may be interpreters between us and the millions whom we govern—a class of persons, Indian in blood and colour but English in taste, in opinions, in morals and in intellect. To that class we may leave it to refine the vernacular dialects of the country and to render them by degrees fit vehicles for conveying knowledge to the great mass of the population."

A few years later in 1839 Lord Auckland spoke in a similar vein and recommended to the General Committee of Public Instruction (appointed in 1823) "to render the highest instruction efficient in a certain number of central colleges rather than employ their funds in the extension of the plan of founding ordinary zilla schools." In 1844 the Governor-General decided on establishing a zilla school in each district subordinate to a central college of which there should be at least one to every five districts.¹ With this object the then Bengal was divided into nine circles of which Krishnagar Circle was to be one unit composed of Krishnagar College with Jessor, Burdwan and Bankura schools. In September 1845, a sum of Rs. 1,41,560 was sanctioned by the Supreme Government to cover the cost of the whole scheme—of which the sum of Rs. 38,900 a year was made immediately available for completing the educational programme in the Hughli and Krishnagar Circles. On the 1st October the following notification was published and widely circulated in English and Bengali throughout the districts of Nadia, Howrah, Baraset, East and West Burdwan—"The Governor-General having sanctioned the foundation of a college at Krishnagar in the district of Nadia, it is hereby notified for general information that the College will open for the admission of pupils on the 1st November, 1845, and instruction will commence as soon after that date as possible.² All applicants will be admitted into College without reference to religion or caste provided they are within the prescribed limits as to age. No boy shall be admitted whose age exceeds sixteen and the course of study will be precisely the same as that pursued at the Hindu College at Calcutta and the College of Muhammad Mohsin at Hughly. At the end of every year a general examination will take place when scholarships, of which eight senior at Rs. 30 and Rs. 40 a month and twelve junior at Rs. 8 a month are attached to the College, will be awarded to those students who are able to pass the requisite test. A local committee has been formed at Krishnagar to whom candidates for admission into the

college will apply. The object of the Government in thus providing the means of a liberal and cheap education for the inhabitants of these populous districts is to advance their moral and intellectual condition and to fit them for taking an adequate part in the administration of public affairs."

In accordance with this notification, a Local Committee composed of I. Bruce, D. J. Money (District Magistrate), E. T. Trevor (Magistrate) and Babu Ram Ilochan Ghosh (Principal Sadar Ameen) was immediately formed to put into effect the scheme for the foundation of Krishnagar College.

Captain D. L. Richardson—the well-known Shakesperian scholar—was appointed as the first Principal of the College and he formally took over charge on the 28th November 1845. The first meeting of the Local Committee held on December 6, 1845, recommended to the Government the appointment of two Head Masters for the Junior and Senior Departments of the College, two pundits and a few junior teachers besides a menial staff composed of two daftaris, two peons, one bearer, one bhisti and two methars.³ It also suggested the taking over of the house of Babu Hari Mohan Mukherjee (of Kajighat, Calcutta) at Krishnagar on Rs. 125 per month for three years from January 1, 1846, described as a house with extensive grounds covering about one hundred bighas of land. On the 20th December 1845, the Local Committee of Management appointed two pundits at Rs. 50 and Rs. 30 per month, respectively, and a Writer and Librarian at Rs. 30 per month and a junior teacher on the same pay. The Government approved of the engaging of the house of Babu Hari Mohan Mukherjee for use of the College at a monthly rent of Rs. 125 and on the 31st December 1845, the Local Committee resolved "Krishnagar College shall be opened tomorrow, the 1st January 1846". The fact of its formal opening on the first day of the New Year was communicated by Principal D. L. Richardson in his letter of 5th January 1846 to J. Mouat, Secretary to the General Committee of Public Instruction. Thus Krishnagar College opened in 1846 in one of the most commodious houses of the town with a compound of hundred bighas situated on the present site of the Krishnagar Head Post Office. The College on the eve of its foundation had to face some official opposition from members of the Committee of Public Instruction but this was overcome through the mediation of Mr. Cecil Beadon who showed his sympathy for the institution from its very start.⁴ The first staff of the College was composed of three Europeans with Captain D. L. Richardson as Principal and ten Bengali teachers, of whom the two most well-known were Pandit Madan Mohan Tarkalankar and Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri. Principal Richardson⁵ born in 1801 lost his father at an early age and joined the Army in his teens. After being invalidated from the Army, he turned to teaching and was a Professor of Literature in the Hindu College before he became Principal at Krishnagar. He was a man of great literary talents, a scholar, a poet and an essayist and his works like "Literary leaves" are a tribute to his genius. His lectures on "English Poetry" were heard by his pupils with rapt attention. Unfortunately for Krishnagar, he was transferred to Hugly College at the end of November 1846. Among the earliest Bengali teachers of the College, the names of Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri and Pandit Madan Mohan Tarkalankar are equally illustrious. Babu Ramtanu Lahiri⁶ served the College as a master of the school section from 1846 till 1851 and again from April 1861 till his retirement in November 1865. As a teacher, he was loved and respected by his pupils. His chief object was to awaken in his pupils a love for knowledge. In him, the boys found also a loving friend who mixed with

them on the play-ground and in the hours of leisure. He taught the young men of Krishnagar to think and act freely. Though he belonged to no religious sect, he was a pious servant of God, glorifying Him in thought, word and deed. Pandit Madan Mohan Tarkalankar served Krishnagar College for a very short time from January to June 1846 when he was transferred to Sanskrit College, only to become a Deputy Collector in 1855. Born in 1817 in the famous Billogram in the district of Nadia and educated at the Sanskrit College, he showed his genius not only as a poet but became a champion of the cause of Female Education and supported Mr. Bethune by sending his own daughters to the Bethune Girls' School for education. He compiled a series of Bengali books like "Sisu-siksha" expressly for the benefit of girls joining the new institution.

Under such teachers as these, Krishnagar College began its career in 1846 to promote the cause of higher education in Bengal—long before the Calcutta University was founded. It must fill the hearts of the people of Nadia with pride to recall that the institution, which has nurtured them so long, has a tradition and heritage even older than that of the Calcutta University to which it is now affiliated as one of its many institutions.

CHAPTER II.

(1846—1856.)

Krishnagar College including the school-section began with a roll strength of 246 boys¹ and by the end of April the number rose to 289 with 283 Hindu boys, 3 Muhammadans and 3 Christians. The senior boys (i.e., College boys) had to pay a monthly fee of Rs. 3 while boys of the junior or school department paid Rs. 2 per month. The non-paying students of the institution were only 14 out of the total of 289. The establishment in 1846 included Principal Richardson and Mr. Beanland in the senior department and ten teachers in the junior department with Mr. S. W. Bradbury as Head Master, and one Head Writer and Librarian. It appears from the Principal's letter to the Local Committee of 26th January 1846 that the original staff strength of the institution was only five masters, and when he complained about the inadequate strength of the staff, the number was raised from five to twelve. Twenty scholarships were made available for boys of the Krishnagar College—eight for senior scholars and twelve for the junior ones. This encouragement was necessary, as the state of education in the Nadia District was deplorably low according to Principal Richardson who wrote in January 1846 that only 2 or 3 boys in the school department of the College had gone beyond the first four rules of Arithmetic. In spite of this general backwardness, Mr. Richardson was able to view with some satisfaction the progress made by the boys of his institution and complimented the teachers², specially Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri, on their assiduous work in his first Annual Report of the College of 19th September 1846. The annual examination of the different classes was conducted in that early period by members of the Local Committee of Management like Mr. Money, the Collector, Mr. Archer, the Civil Surgeon, and Maharaja Sreesh Chandra Roy Bahadur of Nadia. But the College Department was still very weak in roll strength with only eight students varying in age from 16 to 21³. The number of boys fell at the end of the year, not because of the unpopularity of the institution but more on account of the strictness of the rules about attendance and collection of fees insisted on by the Principal. The work of the College was also disturbed by the outbreak of chicken-pox in March 1846 and it had to be closed for a short period. But a greater set-back to the institution was the transfer of a scholar Principal like Mr. Richardson at the end of November 1846 to the Hughli College. The Local Committee naturally viewed his departure from Krishnagar as a great loss to the College. Rochfort, an Irishman, who had spent two years at Trinity College, Dublin, and taught more than twenty years in India, succeeded him as Principal at rather an advanced age and remained in charge of the institution for nearly a decade (December 1846—December 1855). Under his regime, the roll strength of the College on the 30th September 1847 was 258 including two Muhammadans and four Christian boys. The senior department with three classes was run by the Principal and three European masters—Bradbury, Beatson and Beanland—while the junior section consisted of four classes with a number of sections under a staff of eight Bengali teachers and two pundits. The boys made a parody of their teachers in the following verse⁴:-

On the 22nd June 1848 the general control of the College was transferred from the Local Committee to "The Council of Education, Calcutta" and on the 20th February 1849 three of its distinguished members—Hon'ble Mr. Bethune, Mr. Beadon and Dr. Mouat—came to Krishnagar to attend the Prize-day of the College. On this occasion Mr. Bethune made a stirring speech marked by a genuine sympathy for the welfare of the youths of Bengal⁵. After congratulating Umesh Chandra Dutt, a student of this College, for having stood fifth in order of merit in the senior scholarship list of the colleges of Bengal, as an honour to his institution. Mr. Bethune went on to impress on the students the value of education in these words: "When you accept your own education, you ought to comprehend that it is not meant for your own benefit alone. We trust you will become centres of Civilisation from which the rays of knowledge and learning will be disseminated in all directions. Education is but little worth if it does not purify the heart and affections at the same time that it raises and enlarges the intellectual power. It would give me more real satisfaction to know that it is commonly said of the students of Krishnagar College that *not one of them* was even known to falsify his word or to be guilty of a mean or dishonest action than to hear that they had sounded all the depths of English learning and Philosophy". On this occasion he also urged the spread of the culture of the Bengali language by the seekers of higher education in Bengal in these words: "The Language of Bengal is now as rude and uncultivated as that of England was five hundred years ago. It is your taste and learning by which it is to be cultivated and adorned. If you do your duty, the English language will become to Bengal what long ago Greek and Latin were to England and the ideas which you gain through English learning will, by your help, be gradually diffused by a vernacular literature through the masses of your countrymen." These were noble words of a noble-hearted man. Next year on the 6th January Mr. Bethune visited Krishnagar College again and thus re-echoed the same sentiments: "It is among our distinguished scholars that I am most anxious to find writers of pure and elegant Bengali so that we may have a chance of educating some who will give a stimulus to the general intellectual improvement of your countrymen by clothing in a vernacular dress and in a popular form the lessons of wisdom and philosophy which they have learnt from a foreign literature." Mr. Bethune delivered his last address at the College in February 1851 (he died shortly after) when he spoke feelingly of the loss to the College in the premature death of its scholar Ambica Charan Ghosh through an attack of smallpox and praised his friend and competitor Umesh Chandra Dutt for nursing his sick friend like a brave man in these eloquent words: "You, Umesh Chandra Dutt, whom I have so often had occasion to mark out for praise, be assured of this that not even in that moment when from this place I hailed you as the first scholar of your year throughout Bengal—did I look upon you with so kindly a feeling or so hearty a desire to serve you, as when I heard of your affectionate kindness to your dying friend and learned how carefully you

had tended him in his malignant disorder....." Resuming his speech he said, "The education of your females is the next great step to be taken in the regeneration of the Hindu character. The practical difficulty which obstructs the progress of the good work is the seclusion in which you have for a long time been accustomed to think it necessary to confine your women. For her own sake and in her own right I claim for woman her proper place in the scale of created beings. God has given her an intellect, a heart and feelings like your own and these were not given in vain. I may not live to see this desirable goal attained but it is my firm belief that another generation will not pass away before it will be universally conceded that whoever neglects the education of his daughter disgraces himself". These Prize-days were great occasions when the visitors were welcomed by the chief officials and inhabitants of Krishnagar and some of the students received special recognition. Durga Charan Haldar read his Bengali Essay before the College Prize-gathering on the 20th February 1849, when a handsome silver medal was presented by Principal Rochfort to Umesh Chandra Dutt, the most distinguished scholar of Krishnagar College.

These years, however, were marked by no rise in the roll strength of the College. At the end of 1849 it was 231 distributed as follows⁷: 4 senior scholars, 13 junior scholars and 63 paying students in the senior department with 11 free students and 140 paying boys in the junior school. A year later, the number fell to 207 with 120 Brahmin students, 42 Kayasthas and the rest of other castes. The number of Muhammadan and Christian boys was still very low, 5 and 1. This tendency of the College with no rise in the roll strength was partly because the richer classes chose to send their sons to the larger colleges of Calcutta and partly because the rules of admission respecting age and qualifications were strictly carried out. College discipline too was rigorous. Early in 1850, the Principal furnished to the Secretary of the "Council of Education" in compliance with its order of February 13, 1850, a list of names of thirty-two boys who were fined for absence from the College, without sufficient grounds, for a period ranging from four to ten days. Those who failed to explain their absence satisfactorily had their names struck off. Sometimes the explanation offered by the absentee students for exemption from fines was amusing. Two students of the First Year College Class stated in their application to the Principal that their friends had detained them at home for an auspicious day—while one student of the Second Class of the Collegiate School said he was detained to be cured of an itch and another pleaded absence on account of a religious ceremony. Lack of accommodation also stood in the way of the expansion of the College. The rented house ill-accommodated the number of students and three or four classes had to be held in the verandah for want of room. The situation became so desperate during the period of repairs to the College in 1849, that Principal Rochfort was compelled to send each class to its master's house and even the Raja of Nadia was kind enough to permit the holding of the First Class of the Junior Department in his own residence. This "disposition of class"—writes the Principal—"is injurious to discipline and discreditable to the institution."⁸

There were two college classes in 1849-50 with nineteen students in each class. The school department consisted of two senior classes and four junior classes with more than one section. The senior College class, with the exception of two boys who were absent on sick certificate, presented itself for the "Senior Scholarship Examination" while the nineteen students of the Junior College class sat for "The Junior Scholarship Test." Students going in for the higher examination had to take up English Literature, Mental and Moral Philosophy, History, Pure and Mixed Mathematics

besides English and Vernacular Composition. In 1849 the Literature Paper included questions from three books—Addison's "Spectator", Shakespeare's "Julius Cæsar" and "Much Ado About Nothing". In History candidates were examined in a period of English History and "Early Middle Ages". The syllabus for the Junior Scholarship Examination included Grammar, Mathematics, History, Geography, Vernacular Translation and Reading. It is a matter of pride to the College that Umesh Chunder Dutt of Krishnagar College topped the list of all senior scholars of Bengal in the examination of the year 1848-49, and the best Bengali Essay of the examination was written by Nilkamal Bhaduri, another student of the College, who secured Sir H. Maddock's Gold Medal. The various classes of the school had their Annual Examination on the 15th August 1849—which was conducted jointly by the Principal, Mr. Harrison—the Head Master, and the other European teachers of the College—Messrs. Bradbury and Beatson. They did not make favourable comments on the work of the students of the First Class of Senior School and the Principal observed: "I am sorry to say that I am disappointed in the result." But in the case of the boys of the lowest class of the school, the Principal complimented them along with their teacher, Babu Hara Nath Mitter, for their good work. Maharaja Sreesh Chandra Roy Bahadur examined most of the classes in Bengali. Promotions in the school on the result of the examination were rather strict. Thirteen out of twenty-six were detained in the first class of the senior school and only ten out of twenty-nine were promoted from the secoud class.⁹

The Establishment charges of February 1849 were incredibly small and came up to Rs. 2,769-5-9 only as compared with the grand total expenditure of the College in 1941-1942 of Rs. 1,18,643-3. The Establishment charges in February 1849 included Rs. 2,330 as cost of establishment, Rs. 256 as scholarship bill and Rs. 177-5-9 for contingency. The European staff with the Principal and four European masters cost the Government Rs. 1,650 per month while another Rs. 100 was paid to the Civil Surgeon as his monthly allowance for looking after the health of the boys of the College. The Indian staff of ten teachers and three writers or clerks was maintained at a monthly cost of Rs. 527 while the menial staff of thirteen cost the College Rs. 53 per month. Principal Rochfort received a monthly salary of Rs. 600.

The general discipline of the institution was good. The College was held in high esteem, but there was some discontent during the session of 1849 among the inhabitants of the district in consequence of discussion which had been carried on by some students out of college hours, respecting certain Hindu customs in offensive terms.¹⁰ This gave rise to a belief in the town that efforts were made in the College to convert the students. The Principal, however, succeeded in allaying these unfounded apprehensions by putting himself in touch with some of the most respectable inhabitants of Krishnagar and explaining the truth of the matter. Students were consistently fined by the Principal for absence from college without sufficient grounds and the names of some of them were even struck off for deterrent effect. It is no wonder that the students were regular in attendance, observed the regulations of the institution and were respectful to their masters. But in one case the treatment of a junior scholar, Raj Krisen Mitra, by Mr. Bradbury, the Head Master, who was alleged to have kicked the student, created some agitation in the College and his conduct was even criticised by Maharaja Sreesh Chandra Roy Bahadur.¹¹ Two of the teachers—Babu Sreekanta Choudhury and Tarini Charan Roy—who were disrespectful to Mr. Bradbury, resigned their posts on the 1st February 1847, on the latter's formal complaint to the Local Committee.

The College Library was in a good condition with 690 volumes for use and circulation in 1848 but the room accommodating it, was very small and unfit for a library. At the beginning the library grant was only Rs. 100 per year for purchase of books. The first librarian was Babu Jagat Chandra Lahiri who had also the charge of the office and was known as "Head Writer and Librarian." Dr. Mouat presented in 1852 fifty volumes of the "Edinburgh Review" to the College Library. In 1854 (April) Principal Rochfort speaks of the library as "consisting of 1,005 works in 2,066 volumes of which 279 works were added during the current year." Two years later he observed that though the library was popular, many of the books had become old and could only be used with the greatest care. Here is a sample of the list of books in the College library at the end of 1846:—

The general health of the town was unsatisfactory in 1848-49, so much so that the progress of the classes was impeded in a great degree and in March 1850 smallpox made its appearance in an epidemic form and carried off one of the most brilliant senior scholars of the College, Sj. Ambika Charan Ghosh, to whose memory a tablet was raised. The College had to be closed for nearly a month at the end of 1855 on account of the outbreak of cholera in the town. The poverty of the students in the early years of the College was often brought to the notice of the higher authorities and the Principal, in his letter of 17th January 1852, referred to the poverty of the students of this College and pleaded for the retention of scholarships by certain boys. Two years later, Principal Rochfort suggested in his Annual Report that the lowering of the school-fee from Rs. 2 to Re. 1 would help the spread of education, as the inhabitants of Krishnagar were poor. There was a large number of senior and junior scholarships made available for this College which in 1853 had five senior scholars (one being the well-known Sj. Mohini Mohan Roy—the donor of the Mohini Mohan

Prize) and fourteen junior scholars, each enjoying a scholarship of Rs. 8 per month. In November 1845, the Local Committee had been authorised to allow each donor of Rs. 1,000 to send one free-studentship to the College and an additional free-studentship for every Rs. 500 above that sum.¹² In this way thirteen free-studentships came to be allotted in the following manner among the principal donors:—

Krishnagar College came to be progressive in ideas under the influence of teachers like Babu Ramtanu Lahiri and leaders like Maharaja Sreesh Chandra Roy of Nadia. When the subject of "Remarriage of Hindu Widows" became a provincial question in Bengal, the young men of Krishnagar College held a stormy meeting on the premises of the College and, "after talking themselves hoarse on the pernicious customs of Hindu Society, bound themselves by a solemn oath to fight on behalf of the widows of their country." "This attitude of the young reformers so compromised the college at the end of 1850 that many regarding the institution as a hotbed of heterodoxy, withdrew their sons from it."¹³ It would have suffered much more but for the protecting hand of the Raja of Nadia.

Krishnagar College was in a rented house from its inception in January 1846 till May 1856. But the proposal of building a new house for the College had been mooted as early as November 1845. On the 18th November 1845 the Local Committee reported that a meeting presided over by the Maharaja of Nadia had been held at Krishnagar at which donations of the value of Rs. 13,000 approximately were subscribed towards building a college.¹⁴ Of this sum, Rs. 3,000 were donated by the Maharaja himself and another Rs. 2,500 were subscribed by Babu Baman Das Mukherjee, Zamindar. In 1851, the donations reached the figure of Rs. 14,833. There was general dissatisfaction in the town at no college building having been erected after a lapse of five years of promise, even though it was obvious from the Principal's Report of September 1850 that the rented house offered very inadequate accommodation for all the classes. In 1852 the Principal was glad to announce that the foundation of the new building had been laid. One hundred bighas of land were purchased for the site of the College and the details of the purchase are recorded in a letter of the Principal of 28th February 1859.¹⁵ More than sixty bighas were purchased from Mr. Hills, an Indigo planter, for Rs. 6,000 by the Hon'ble Mr. Bethune in 1851, of which thirty-three bighas and nineteen kathas were *lakharaj* and the remainder twenty-seven bighas and one katha was subject to a rent of Rs. 20 per year payable to the Maharaja of Nadia which, however, was waived by him in favour of the College (*vide* Deed of Conveyance of 30th December 1851).

Land upward of thirty bighas was the gift of Ranee Swarnamayi of Kassimbazar to the College by another Deed of Conveyance. Thus the extensive lands for the site of the new College building had been acquired and the work of construction was commenced in 1852. The grand building was completed in March 1856 at a total cost of Rs. 66,876, of which Rs: 17,000 was raised by private donations. It was not actually occupied for use till the 1st June 1856.¹⁶ The new building was a noble edifice erected after a design of Messrs. Burn & Co. and stood on three bighas of land, surrounded by a compound of more than one hundred bighas. The roads alone on the premises leading from the four entrances of the College were upwards of half-a-mile in extent. The bungalow in front of the College building had been demolished so as not to intercept the fine view of the College. The Latin numerals—MDCCCLVI—inscribed in bold letters in front of the main College building denote the significant event of the erection of the new house for Krishnagar College which up to the end of May 1856 had been located in a hired house in another part of the town. Thus Krishnagar College entered on the next memorable period of its existence in the noblest of surroundings and stood in all her majesty like the "Alma Mater"—ever ready to offer her gifts of knowledge to all her sons who sought them.

CHAPTER III.

(1856—1875.)

The new college came also to have a new head. Principal Rochfort, after nine years of devoted service, retired in December 1855 and was succeeded by Mr. E. Lodge, B.A. On the eve of Rochfort's retirement, the Local Committee placed on record its appreciation of his services in these words¹—“Upwards of nine years, you entered on your duties at Krishnagar and we find that two or three years afterwards, the foremost pupil of the College occupied the fifth place in the competitive list of all the colleges of Bengal. In proof of the material advantages derived by the pupils from the education received here, we may glance at the positions which some of them now hold—two are masters in this college, four are masters in Berhampore College, four in the Nizamat, two in the Sanskrit College, four are teachers in Government Schools, one is Munsiff, four are Darogas and many more have entered the public service as Writers. The members of the Committee do earnestly hope that you in your native country will enjoy many years of rest and happiness and bid you a cordial farewell.” In January 1855, according to the scheme of the Educational Despatch of July 1854, the College came under the control of the Director of Public Instruction who now superseded the old Council of Education. The first Director was W. Gordon Young, who was a civilian, familiar with the routine methods of departmental administration but with no special knowledge of education and incapable of taking that larger and generous view of education which characterised the regime of men like Macaulay and Bethune. One has only to glance through the addresses delivered by Mr. Bethune on the Annual Prize Days at Krishnagar College between 1849—1851 to realise their breadth of vision and the ring of sincerity and human touch in all their expressions. Under the new regime, to quote Mr. Zachariah, “the flowers of human charity and generous praise withered in the arid climate of departmental administration”. A letter of the Director of 14th May 1855 indicates this mechanical spirit of the department in prescribing the duties of the Principal as keeping the accounts of the institution in order and carrying out the orders of the Department of Education besides teaching his students in his particular subject. The duties of the Local Committees are also defined clearly and they are warned not to do anything to disturb the regular course of instruction or the internal management of the institution in matters of discipline. All the same, the Local Committee at Krishnagar played a very active role as the local advisory body of the College and held not only regular meetings but its members in their individual capacity visited the College by turn every month. The record for the six months from July 1856 to December 1856 was as follows:—

In August 1857 the Local Committee recommended the appointment of Kumar Satish Chandra Roy as a member in place of his deceased father, Maharaja Sreesh Chandra Roy Bahadur of Nadia, on the ground that he was of good character, educated in the local College, opulent and as the head of Hindu society capable of exercising great influence in favour of

native education in the zilla of Krishnagar. In recording his appointment, the Local Committee spoke also of the invaluable services of his father to the College.

The most important change of this period affecting the intellectual life of the institution was the foundation of the Calcutta University early in 1857 on the model of the London University as an examining and non-resident Corporation.² The first Entrance Examination of the College under the Calcutta University was held in 1858 in which five candidates appeared and all passed to the credit of the institution. But the successful entrance candidates who joined the college classes continued to sit for "The Senior Scholarship Test" at the end of their Second Year. In January 1862, the first examination in Arts was held at Krishnagar for the first time. No student of the College appeared for B.A. till 1867.

The number of students in Krishnagar College rose from 217 in 1857 to 324 in 1861 and fell again to 281 in 1867. Principal A. Smith attributed this fall in the roll strength of the College to the abnormal situation created by the ravages of the deadly epidemic (Malaria) and a famine for the last three years prior to 1867, but in his opinion there was no reason for alarm about the future of the institution and he strongly disapproved of the unfavourable report of Mr. Chapman, the Commissioner, in 1867—"that the small number of students benefiting by College education did not justify the large expenditure incurred by the Government for its maintenance."³ A year later, there was a rise in the roll strength from 281 to 338 (school, college and law departments combined). The purely College roll strength showed also a steady rise from 61 in 1864 to 127 in 1870 with five Honours students. This was partially due to the decline of Malaria in the town. The Law Department, opened in Krishnagar College in March 1865⁴, had 36 boys on its rolls and required only four more students "to render the Law Department self-supporting". In the Annual Report of April 1869 Principal Smith remarked that sons of Zemindars preponderated over all other classes in the race for higher education. On the roll strength of the College in 1870, there were fifty boys who were sons of landowners out of a total of 116⁵. The son of one of the foremost landowners of Bengal, the young Raja of Cooch-Behar, was its pupil in the school branch in 1854 and special arrangements were made for his residence and instruction at Krishnagar. Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt, a teacher of the institution, was appointed as his Private Tutor and he instructed the young Raja every morning and evening. His work in school, however, was not satisfactory. He was irregular in attendance and absented himself from class on flimsy grounds of illness. His establishment was in the greatest disorder and his durwans were so impertinent that when the Principal ordered one to be dismissed, he had the audacity to tell the Principal that he was not a white man's servant. A few of his contemporaries became distinguished men in their later life. Babu Jadu Nath Chatterjee became a distinguished member of the Krishnagar Bar and Babu Kalika Das Dutt became Dewan of the Cooch-Behar State, while Mr. Mon Mohan Ghosh, the celebrated Bar.-at-Law, became one of the foremost Public men of Bengal.

There was an increase in the roll strength of Muhammadan students at the end of this period through the grant of scholarships from Mohsin Fund.⁶ Fifty-two enjoyed them in 1875 in this institution, as compared with the very small number of Moslem boys before this grant.

There was a complete reorganisation of the classes of the College. In 1856, the distinction between the senior and junior departments of the school was abolished in accordance with the instructions of the Director of Public Instruction and the classes were numbered consecutively from the First Class to the lowest or Seventh Class. The boys of the First Class sat for the "Junior Scholarship Test" till 1858, when the University Entrance Examination was introduced. The age of boys in the school varied from 18 in the highest class to nine in the lowest. In May 1865, the Principal in his Annual Report was able to announce the expansion of the College by the addition of the Third and Fourth Year classes*. "This news was received with unmixed joy both by the College and the native community and was confirmed by the appointment of three additional members on the College staff—Babu Nakuleswar Banerjee as Assistant Professor of Sanskrit, Babu Prasanna Kumar Bose as Law Lecturer and Mr. Masters as Additional Professor." The Law Department was also a feature of the new expansion of the College in March 1865 which made the Principal record with a sense of pleasure in his Annual Report of 14th June 1866 of the rise in roll strength from 61 to 74. In 1870 the College had the M.A. Class also, as three students sat for M.A. from Krishnagar in that year. The Surveying Department was opened in August 1872 with Babu Hem Chandra Mitra as the first Surveying teacher on Rs. 105 per month. The number on the rolls of this Department at the end of March 1873 was 147 with boys recruited from the First Year College class and the three upper classes of the school. But the subject was not popular and a year later, the roll strength fell from 147 to 87 while the First Year College Surveying Class was discontinued. The Department, however, continued to function till the end of this period.

Chemistry was introduced in 1873 as a compulsory subject in First Arts under the new regulations of the Calcutta University, though Principal Lobb regretted the introduction of this subject without Physics as unsatisfactory. The Law Department was popular since its foundation in 1865. In 1868, the number of Law students was 36 but five years later, it suddenly dropped to seven on account of the abolition of the B.A. classes in 1872 and the steady fall in income of the legal practitioners. But the darkest shadow fell on the institution, when the B.A. classes of Krishnagar College were abolished. In 1871-72 there was a fresh agitation for public economy. Sir George Campbell, a man of fierce energy and drive, was then the Lieutenant-Governor. He was bent on reforming the whole administration and in the realm of education was anxious that Elementary Education should be extended, the money necessary for the purpose being found partly by retrenchment in higher education. Krishnagar College was thus (along with Berhampore College) to be one of the victims of his new policy and was reduced to a Second Grade College*. The effect of this lowering of the status of the College upon its roll strength was naturally unfavourable. The number of students fell from 127 in 1870 to 53 in 1873 with only the two F.A. classes intact. Of these 52, only two were Muhammadans and the rest Hindus, with a large Brahmin element. The number in the Law classes too fell from 36 in 1872 to 4 in 1874 and 1 in 1875 but the department was retained as the Government contemplated the early restoration of the B.A. Classes. Under the orders of Sir Richard Temple*, the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, the B.A. classes were again restored in 1875 and Krishnagar College became once more a First Grade Institution.

"The Junior Scholarship Test" was superseded by the Entrance Examination of the University in 1858 when five students appeared in it from this institution. All the five passed. The Second Year College class

continued to sit for "The Senior Scholarship Test" till January 1862 and three out of seven candidates gained senior scholarships in 1861. The F.A. Examination was held at Krishnagar College in January 1862 in which nine out of thirteen candidates passed with two in the First Division and seven in the Second Division. In 1867 Krishnagar College sent up for the first time five of her students to sit for the University B.A. Examination in which only two were successful—Srijut Jadu Nath Mukherjee and Srijut Jadunath Bhattacharyya. Two years later, five appeared in B.A. and all passed. In 1870, three students appeared successfully in M.A. with History from this College and were placed in Class II. In 1872 seven out of 36 students took the B.L. Examination and six passed. Two years later, Tara Das Banerjee sat for B.L. and not only passed in the First Division but topped the list of his year. The F.A. results were uniformly unsatisfactory in the seventies, as the following record will show:—

Principal Lobb who was attached to this College from 1870-74 ascribed this poor result in F.A. to a number of causes, such as bad material, weakness of English composition, numerous changes in the staff and finally the insistence by the University that candidates should pass in all subjects. The only bright spot in this poor record of the College was in 1874 when Srijut Pramatha Nath Bose, the well-known scientist of later years, occupied the fifth place in order of merit in the F.A. Examination. The First Year College class had its Annual Examination in 1858 and the boys were examined by Dr. Halls in History, by Maharaja Satish Chandra Roy in Vernacular and by the Principal in English Literature which included such text-books as Defoe's History of the Plague, Addison's Spectator. Most of the answer papers in English evinced faults of grammar and spelling. The Principal in his Annual Report of the year gives the following sample of English written by the average student of the First Year Class from his answer books:—

"Defoe did not go astray from the town".

"A heavy shower of rain subsided".

"When the Plague raised to great violence".

"From the history of the Plague, it can be also concluded that what disturbances arises in Government, when any infectious disease prevail".

One student, however, named Mrityunjoy Roy, acquitted himself very well and obtained 96 out of 100 marks. In vernacular, each of the twelve lads (average age about 19 years) obtained more than 50 per cent marks. In 1861, the first boy of the First Year Class, Lakshmi Nath Das, obtained 336½ marks out of 500 in all the papers and the examiner in English, Mr. MacGregor, complimented the First Year students on their knowledge of English in these words—"In English most of the lads show a familiarity with the English Literature of Queen Anne's time which would be creditable to many English youths." The examination of the various classes of the school from the Second Class to the Seventh was conducted by the Principal, the Head Master and the Maharaja with the same thoroughness

and particular students in each class were recommended for prizes. The First Class of the school sat for the Entrance Examination of the University in 1858.

The Syllabus of the Pre-Entrance Class was not a heavy one. In 1858, the text-books prescribed were—

English—Southey's Life of Nelson and Cowper's Poems (by Task).

History—Keightly's History of Rome.

Geography—Stewart's General Geography.

Mathematics—Two books of Euclid, Algebraic Fractions and Arithmetic.

The favourite books prescribed in vernacular were works like "Kadambari and Sakuntala" in the higher classes and "Bodhoday (বোধোদয়) and Charupath" (চারুপাঠ) in the lower forms. Vidyasagar's Bengali Grammar was also a favourite text-book. In 1872 Principal Lobb forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction a list of Bengali books used in Government schools¹⁰, such as Bengali translation of Sanskrit works like Mahabharat, Ramayana, Raghuvansa, Sakuntala, and books like " সীতার বন্দৰ্স, " "পদ্মপাঠ, " "নীতিবোধ, " "চারুপাঠ, " Most of these works had a large vocabulary of Sanskrit words but "The Mahabharat and the Ramayana" were written in a simple style and were popular with shop-keepers who read them in their leisure time. One work " অলালের ঘরের দুলাল " received special mention in this list as an original work in Bengali written in the current spoken vernacular of the people.

Prizes were awarded every year to the best students of each class. Principal Lobb in his Annual Report of 1872 thus spoke of the Annual Prize Ceremony¹¹—“The last prizes that were distributed were those of 1869. It was impossible to give any prizes for 1870, though we had a ceremony in the College last January when the Bishop of Calcutta presided. As no books were forthcoming, we had to restrict ourselves to reading out the names of the prize-winners. A prize of a silver watch was awarded last year by Babu Mohini Mohan Roy to the best Mathematician of the College. It was given to the successful competitor by the Bishop and was the only one—not conspicuous by its absence.”

In 1875 the College received an Annual Grant of Mohsin Fund for poor Moslem students of which fifty-two boys of the institution were enjoying the benefit. In the same year Babu Naffar Palchoudhuri, the wellknown Zamindar of the District, not only made a donation of Rs. 5,000 to the Krishnagar College Endowment Fund but offered a prize to the best successful candidate of Krishnagar College in the first list of Graduates under the Restoration, to be named "The Temple Prize" in honour of Sir Richard Temple, the Lieutenant-Governor, who had restored this College to its first-grade status¹².

The College staff in November 1856 was composed of Principal Mr. E. Lodge and Mr. S. W. Bradbury, the Head Master, while the school department consisted of thirteen masters with Messrs. Clermont and Beatson as the first and second teachers. Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt was next in rank. The office establishment of the College was run by three writers and the menial staff comprised twenty servants with four malis, three choukidars, three mehtars, one durwan, one bhisti, one water-bearer, two daftaris, two peons and three bearers. The Civil Surgeon was the medical attendant of the College. Principal Rochfort had been succeeded by Mr. E. Lodge, B.A., at the end of 1855. He served the College till the

2nd April 1857 and was followed by Mr. L. Clint as Principal from 13th July 1857 till the 25th June 1858. Mr. A. Smith succeeded Clint and served the College till the succession¹³ of Principal S. Lobb, M.A., in February 1870¹⁴. For the next four years Mr. Lobb was in charge of the institution and was succeeded by Mr. R. Lethbridge, M.A., on the 21st June 1874¹⁵. Most of these Principals were good scholars. Mr. L. Clint, a Prizeman and senior Optime of Trinity College, Cambridge, was drawn from the "Artillery service" into teaching and joined the Hindu College as Master in 1838. He was Principal of Hughli College before he came to Krishnagar. He was an able and excellent officer and members of the Local Committee expressed their sense of public loss to Krishnagar, when he resigned his office. The next three Principals—Smith, Lobb and Lethbridge—belonged to a new regime when the Higher Educational Service was reorganised in 1865 to attract a better class of scholars from England in the Education Department. Samuel Lobb was a Cambridge man who was Principal of Hughli College before he came to Krishnagar. He held rather strong but Conservative views on "Education" and in one of his letters to the Director of Public Instruction he gave his opinion against the further expansion of Western Education under state patronage in these words¹⁶—"Our high education, as it is termed, has been tried, and in the opinion of many, found wanting—is it likely that we shall be more successful in our experiments on the masses?..... The Government had better not extend its educational operations but gradually retire from its present position so that the people may, ere long, obtain control over their own education." For all his Conservative views, he was a man of drive and initiative, who had not only the courage of conviction but infused new vigour into the administration of the College. All his Annual Reports from 1870-1874 were written in a masterly fashion and evinced a literary flavour rarely to be found in the modern reports of Educational Institutions. He was a man who recognised and appreciated the worth of even the humblest of his colleagues and recommended his Head Writer, Babu Raj Mohan Pal, to the Department for promotion in these words—"He is constantly at his desk from 10 a.m. to 4 or 5 p.m. both in term time and during a great part of the vacations. Without his aid, I should have been helpless." Mr. R. Lethbridge, who succeeded Principal Lobb in June 1874, was an M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, and joined the Educational Service in 1868. He served Krishnagar College from June 1874 till March 1877¹⁷. A great scholar with double Honours in Classics and Mathematics from Oxford, he won the love of his students by his kindness, lofty character and amiable manners. He was a great friend of the poor students and helped many to have their education at his expense.

In 1865, with the introduction of the B.A. classes in the College, the staff was strengthened by the addition of an Assistant Professor of Sanskrit, a Law Lecturer, and an additional Professor. Mr. Masters was engaged in the third post but he died on the 5th March 1868 after an illness of less than a week from Typhoid. His pupils erected a tablet to his memory in the College Hall as a mark of their esteem for his many qualities and high sense of duty. Another teacher, Mr. Beatson, died on the 31st December 1863 after a long service of seventeen years in Krishnagar College. Two other English Professors of the period deserve mention; Mr. McCrindle, the classical scholar and Translator of the Greek Account of Megasthenes who was transferred to Patna College in 1867, and Professor Nesfield, the famous Grammarian, who succeeded him at Krishnagar. In 1873 when Chemistry was introduced as a subject for F.A. in this College, Babu Ambica Charan Sen was appointed as the first

Chemistry teacher who subsequently went to England for study of Agriculture and at last joined the Bengal Civil Service. The two most well-known Bengali teachers of this period were Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri and Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt. Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri who was educated in the Hindu College joined this institution as one of her first teachers in January 1846. He retired from Krishnagar College at the end of 1865 after thirty-two years of service. While forwarding his application to the Government for retirement on pension, Principal A. Smith remarked—"In him the Government will lose the services of an Educational officer than whom no officer has discharged his duties with greater zeal and devotion or has laboured more assiduously and successfully for the moral elevation of his pupils." On his death in August 1898, the students of Krishnagar College raised a tablet in the College Hall to perpetuate his memory, Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt was another brilliant acquisition of Krishnagar College both as a pupil and a teacher.¹⁷ In 1849, he was the topmost senior scholar of his year upon which Mr. Bethune, President of the Council of Education, congratulated him for the honour he had gained for himself and for his College. In 1851 he joined the Education Department and served Krishnagar College both as a teacher and as a Professor, from 1867 till he went on long leave in 1881 preparatory to his retirement in 1883. In 1875, he became its first officiating Indian Principal and was complimented by Principal Lethbridge on his return from leave "as the first native gentleman who has successfully managed a muffussil College."¹⁸ Another Principal (Lobb) spoke of him as one of the best native scholars of the Department, well-read in History and well-versed in Mathematics. His retirement in 1883 and his death on the 8th July 1916 marked the loss of one of the foremost builders of Krishnagar College. Babu Umesh Dutt was a man of exemplary self-sacrifice and nursed his College friend, Srijut Ambika Ghosh during his attack of small-pox at the risk of his own life. It is also said that on his transfer from Chittagong to Krishnagar, he placed his own sick servant in the "palki" and himself walked on foot a journey of five days.

There were four members assisting the College work besides the Principal in 1873. The B.A. classes had been abolished and so the only classes in the College were the First and Second Year classes. The daily distribution of work was Principal—three hours, two Assistant Professors—three hours each, Professor of Chemistry—three hours and the Head Master—four hours. The hours of work in the College were from 10 a.m. to 4-30 p.m., but that of the school ended earlier at 2-30 every day. What is of greater interest is that the three Professors helped in the teaching work of the school in Sanskrit and English, while the Head Master, Babu Bireswar Mitra, taught Mathematics and History in the First Year College Class.

The College establishment in April 1857 with the Principal, two European masters (in the College Department), three writers and twenty menials cost the Government Rs. 2,468. The total establishment charges for April came up to Rs. 2,638-12 distributed as follows:—

In April the contingency charges was about the same Rs. 53-12, the biggest item being printing charges for 2,000 schooling bills at Rs. 13-8 per thousand, viz., Rs. 27.

The total expenditure of the College establishment including the school department came up to Rs. 32,257-10-11 for the year 1856-1857 while the annual income as derived from the following sources was Rs. 36,942-12-7:—

In 1865 the total annual expenditure of the College establishment came up to Rs. 34,179-2-1 with five members on the College staff, twelve in the School Department, three Writers and twenty menials. The annual income of the College was Rs. 36,845-1 with Government grant of Rs. 26,448 and schooling fees of the sum of Rs. 8,397-1.¹⁰ This shows a decline in the income of the College and a rise in the expenditure owing to the increased College staff. The tenth teacher received only Rs. 20 per month and the third Writer Rs. 12 only. The menial staff was also paid on a low scale in 1865:—

In 1872, the annual expenditure of the College including the Collegiate School and Law Department increased considerably and reached the figure Rs. 52,857-2 while the income of the year showed a corresponding rise and was Rs. 52,794-6.²⁰ Out of the total expenditure, the purely College side cost the Government Rs. 33,240-12-5 and the rest was divided between the Law Department and the School establishment. This large increase of expenditure was partly due to the increased staff and the higher pay of the Principal and four Professors. It was also due to the introduction of the Law and Surveying Departments. The Principal received a salary of Rs. 1,000 per month, the two senior professors Rs. 750 and Rs. 600 each while the two assistant professors received Rs. 400 and Rs. 150 per month, respectively. The average cost of educating each student per year came up to Rs. 316-9-3 of which the net cost to Government was Rs. 259-4. In 1875 the income and expenditure showed a remarkable drop to Rs. 29,760-0-10 on account of the abolition of the B.A. classes of the College and a reduced staff in consequence. Two professorships were abolished and only one writer was retained in place of three.

There was a special Fund known as "The Chest Fund" which had been in existence since 1846²¹ and was derived from sale of branches of trees, fruits and grass in the compound. It came up to Rs. 156-1-8 in 1874 and was useful in meeting unforeseen contingencies. Some letters of the College Principals throw an interesting sidelight on the prices of articles and cost of labour which obtained in this period. Principal L. Clint, before proceeding to Europe, asked for the sanction of the Local Committee for purchase of some of his effects by the College at the following prices²² :—

The question of pay and prospects of the teaching staff of the Education Department came into prominence on account of the steady expansion of secondary and higher education in the province. The standard of attainments prescribed by the New University Regulations required a teaching staff with high educational qualifications. In 1865 the Higher Educational Service was reorganised and its members were put on graded salaries.²⁴ The Principal of Krishnagar College was placed in Class II on Rs. 1,000—1,250. This improvement in pay and prospects now attracted men of higher academic distinction from British Universities like C. H. Tawney, A. W. Croft, Alexander Pedler (afterwards F.R.S.) and George Watt who were all persons of outstanding merit and would have adorned any department. The pay and prospects of the Indian teaching staff of the department continued to remain discouraging much longer. In 1858, the most senior Indian teacher of Krishnagar College, Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt, received a pay of Rs. 200 per month only after seven years of service and the eleventh teacher was paid only Rs. 20 a month. In 1865, the Indian staff of Krishnagar College forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction a memorial praying for a time-scale increase of pay in these words²⁵—“The man who receives Rs. 25 to Rs. 50 a month for his work needs as much encouragement as he who draws Rs. 500 and yet the scheme of the Government only recognises the claims of the latter while ignoring equally the just claims of the former”..... “We need hardly allude to the rise in the prices of the necessaries of life which has been steadily going on during the last twenty or twenty-five years and seriously inconveniences people like ourselves. Our humble prayer, therefore, is that you will be pleased to use your influence with the Government in extending the benefits of the scheme to all officers of the Department under your control.” As early as 1867, a scheme for grading the lower posts was prepared but it was in 1878 that the “Subordinate Educational Service” was reorganised in seven grades.

The College Library in 1857 consisted of 2,275 volumes and 321 pamphlets for use and circulation and was in perfect order according to the Annual Report of the Principal. In 1860, the Library came to have a Reading Room with a large table for general use and the Principal was pleased to state in his report of the year that there was no wanton act of ill-treatment of books by the students. With the introduction of “Law” as a subject in the College in 1865, Rs. 700 was sanctioned for the purchase of standard works in Law and, before long, the books in the Law Department began to assume the appearance and proportions of a Library in itself.²⁶ “Not less than ninety books were taken down daily from the shelves”, adds the Principal’s report in 1867. A year later, the Principal praised the Library in the following words:—“Both as a Reading-room and as a treasury of intellectual wealth, the Library maintained its two-fold character and reputation”, and offered to students “a cool and clean asylum” from the ever

noisy distractions of the impure bazar." But from 1870, the Principals in their reports speak of the Library in a somewhat different tone. Mr. Lobb complained in 1870 that there was a number of superfluous books in the Library which were rarely used by teachers or students and might be disposed of by sale. The Annual Library grant sanctioned by the Government in 1871 was Rs. 1,200 but the regulation of the Home Department, viz., that indents for British publications must be made through the Secretary of State for India, created such difficulties in procuring supply of books for the College that no additions could be made to the library for the next two years. It was only in 1874 that the Principal could announce the addition of seventy extra volumes which were received from England, six months after the order had been placed on the 30th June 1873. "Such was the speedy mode in which the new Government rule worked without any financial saving." The post of the College Librarian was restored and Babu Dina Nath Sen was reappointed as "Librarian" on his old pay in January 1875.

The scientific instruments of the College were a good collection which dates from 1847, when a sum of Rs. 1,389 was devoted for the purchase of an elaborate apparatus for illustrating the most important phenomena of the Physical Science. But the Principal complained in 1870 that few of these instruments were of little practical use, since the University set no great value on "Physical Science."²⁷ Additions were made from time to time chiefly of expensive optical instruments. An excellent microscope of great power and the latest construction was obtained for the College in 1861 and another valuable addition since 1847 was an astronomical and terrestrial telescope of 2½-inch aperture which was in constant use.²⁸ The University came to attach greater importance to Science subjects and when in 1873, Chemistry was introduced as a subject in F.A. under the new regulations, orders were placed in England for certain chemical apparatus.

The College furniture became dilapidated by constant use in the last 18 years. The Principal was compelled to state in 1864 that it had become "more or less unserviceable from old age" and approached the Government for a special grant of Rs. 1,297.8 for new furniture for the College.²⁹ A liberal allowance was obtained in 1865, chargeable to the Surplus Fee Fund for the construction of new furniture and thus it was possible to replace the old desks gradually by new ones.

The College Hostel was in the proposal stage for a long time. The first proposal for a boarding house for students of this institution was made in 1865 when Mr. Smith was Principal, but the scheme fell through for want of funds. In 1874 Principal Lethbridge submitted a fresh proposal for a Students' Hostel³⁰ and urged its special need for those boys "who have no guardians here and live in miserable lodging-houses in the bazar, susceptible to all the vices and temptations of the town." According to his estimate, the number of boarders likely to join the Hostel might be fifty and the expenses likely to be incurred per month on all heads would not exceed Rs. 380 with the total amount distributed as follows:—

From these figures, it appears that education was comparatively cheap in the period when boarders were to be charged less than Rs. 4 per head for a full month for board and lodging. In a letter of July 1876, the Principal was glad to announce the formal opening of the College Hostel on the 17th June with twenty boarders.³¹

The present mansion of the College was occupied on the 1st June 1856. It maintained its noble appearance throughout the period. In 1860, the College compound was completely enclosed with handsome gateways erected at the chief entrances. Four years later in October 1864, the building sustained great damage to its glass and woodwork by the cyclone of the year.³² Several doors including the large ones at the east and west ends of the corridor were blown in, all the skylights were demolished and a beam in one of the class-rooms fractured so dangerously that it became necessary to vacate the room. Large scale repairs were undertaken in April 1867 and again in 1872. Three years later, the whole building was coloured a pale slate-blue instead of the old buff which had become very dirty. A new water-house for the use of students was also built. There were occasional complaints of the Principal about large scale repairs to the College being undertaken in the middle of the session instead of in one of the regular College vacations. In 1867, triennial repairs extended over a period of three months and it was not till the 2nd week of March that all the classes were able to resume their studies. The Principal also raised objection in 1865 about the excessive municipal taxes levied on the College building by the lately established Municipality of Krishnagar, viz., Rs. 67-8 per quarter (the College being assessed at the large annual rent of Rs. 4,500), and lodged an appeal to the Director of Public Instruction for its reduction through the proper channel.³³

In the early part of this period the case of two European members of the College staff came under close public scrutiny. Mr. Clermont, the Second Master, was suspended on the 1st August 1857, for a month by the Local Committee for his addiction to drink. On the basis of the report of Dr. Palmer, the Civil Surgeon,—“That Mr. Clermont is in the habit of indulging in brandy which frequently renders him incapable of attending the College”.³⁴ Three months later, he was suspended a second time upon which he tendered his resignation. The other case was that of Mr. Beatson in May 1859 when certain inhabitants of Krishnagar represented to the Local Committee against his conduct and his alleged incompetence as a teacher but the Committee rightly decided in the best interest of the College that it was not the province of the boys or their relatives to judge the abilities of the teachers and pronounce on their competence or incompetence. The general discipline of the College was good and Principal Lethbridge paid a high compliment to Krishnagar boys in 1875 when he said³⁵: “I have always found our boys so anxious to learn, so full of gratitude for kindness and of respect for due authority.”

Games.—Cricket was the most popular game in the early days of the College. Mr. Lodge, the third Principal of the College, was himself a keen sportsman and played Cricket daily with his students throughout the sultry months of June and July. In 1856 he sent a College cricket team in charge of Professor Unesh Chandra Dutt for a friendly match with the Hughli College which was won. The College met in the morning hours from 6-30 a.m. to 10-30 a.m. for a week previous to the “Annual Cricket Match with the Hughli College” in 1857 by order of the Principal at the request of his pupils. Under the regime of Principal A. Smith (1858-1870) even indigenous games like “Hadududu” became popular.

In the early years of the College it observed a month's holiday for Durga Puja and 15 days for other festivals.³⁶ In September 1853 a list of holidays was drawn up for Government Colleges with a Summer Vacation of 45 days from 15th April to the end of May and 15 days only for Durga Puja. In addition, there were to be only two Hindu holidays (Jagadhatri and Saraswati) and three Christmas holidays (Christmas, New Year and Good Friday), thus making a total of 65 days.³⁷ This list of holidays was actually observed by the College in 1857. In 1858 the University examinations were moved to December and consequently the holiday-list had to be revised once more. The Summer Vacation was reduced to fifteen days in May, the Durga Puja was still to have 15 days while the long vacation was shifted to December and was to last a month from about the 10th December to the 9th January. There were also various minor Hindu holidays, such as Doljatra, Charak Puja, Rathajatra, Janmastami, Jagatdhatri Puja. The Krishnagar College students and teachers wanted a longer Summer Vacation in 1863 but the Principal was not in its favour as he thought that the College with its spacious and airy rooms, with the undulations of the punkhas, in a great measure mitigated the heat of the season and the extension of the Summer Vacation would correspondingly reduce the Christmas holidays. In March 1876, with the increase of Muhammadan students in the College the Principal suggested the observance of certain Muhammadan holidays like Muharram and Id, but from the list of holidays drawn up by Mr. Paulson, the Officiating Principal in 1879, it appears that the recommendation was not put into effect, though the number of holidays was greatly increased with one month each for the Summer and Winter Vacations, 17 days for Durga Puja and another 17 days for various other Hindu festivals like Kali Puja, Rathajatra, Baradol, Jhulan, Janmastami, Jagadhatri and Sree Panchami. Special holidays were given for emergencies, as in 1855 when the College had to be closed for a month in December owing to the outbreak of cholera in the town. Towards the end of this period, Krishnagar College was honoured by the visits of a number of distinguished men.³⁸ In February 1870, Rev. J. Long visited the College for enquiry into the state of progress in vernacular literature and has furnished the following list of names of "Alumni" of the College who wrote various vernacular works:—

One or two quotations from some of the works mentioned above may be of interest. Here is one from "সংজ্ঞা" by Mr. Khodadad, published in 1866, an eulogy of Krishnagar College—

The next is from “শুভীরঞ্জন” by Dwarka Nath Adhikary, published at the Prabhakar Press in 1855, and refers to the two well-known scholars of Krishnagar College, one of whom, Sj. Ambika Charan Ghosh, died prematurely while a student of Krishnagar College, through an attack of small-pox and the other was his contemporary Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt who subsequently became the first Indian Principal of this College:—

In January 1872 the Bishop of Calcutta came to Krishnagar to preside over the Prize-giving Ceremony of the College which was marked by the conspicuous absence of prizes. The names of the prize-winners were only read out and the only prize given on this occasion was a silver watch awarded to the best Mathematician of the College. Two years later in September 1874, Sir Richard Temple, the Lieutenant-Governor, paid a visit to the College in connection with the proposal for the restoration of the B.A. classes which had been abolished in 1871. He visited every class and addressed the students of the College, exhorting them to learn Sanskrit and emulate the example of the far-famed Pandits of Nadia in olden times. His Honour also graciously accepted an address from the students which was presented in the Hall by Purna Chandra Mitra, a student of the Second Year Class, and granted them a holiday of three days.³⁹

The meeting passed four resolutions of which one was to form a Committee composed of the high officials of Nadia, the Principal and distinguished men like Pandit Iswar Chandra Vidyasagar, Babu Naffar Palchoudhuri and Mr. Mou Mohan Ghosh. A subscription was opened on the spot and the handsome donation of Rs. 16,755 was subscribed for by gentlemen present in the room.

The histrionic tradition of Krishnagar College can be traced to this period. On the night of 17th July 1870, the play of "নবীন তপশিলী" by Babu Dina Bandhu Mitra was staged in the College with the actors being mainly students.⁴¹ It was organised through the efforts of a band of enterprising young men of the College who had formed a local "Dramatic society" and was attended by the elite of the town including the well-known public man of Krishnagar, Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri. Though two English plays—Addison's "Cato" and Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice"—had already been staged in the College in May 1869-1870, this was the first occasion when a Bengali play was acted in Krishnagar. One of the great misfortunes of Krishnagar College in this period was the series of epidemics and the pestilence of malaria which told heavily on Krishnagar and the College. As early as the fifties, Krishnagar was a recognised Sanitarium. The Author of "Rural Life in Bengal" thus wrote of Krishnagar in 1858⁴²— "Krishnagar is a delightful place and for salubrity bears the very highest reputation—the only fault I can find with it is that, as a station, it is so very straggling. There is a handsome little church and Government College where about 400 students receive a similar course of education to that imparted in Calcutta Colleges. Krishnagar also boasts a park—a truly beautiful English-like place. The centre is a race course while plantations of magnificent teak trees and the sisu everywhere meet the eye."

This rosy picture of Krishnagar suffered an eclipse in the sixties and the Principal in his Annual Report of 1863 (14th May 1863) referred to the unhealthiness of Krishnagar, the outbreak of Cholera and the consequent fall in the roll strength of the College. In 1867 the Principal struck the same note of pessimism—"the town continues to be the seat of the epidemic fever which has desolated it for five years past." The College roll strength began to rise with the decline of malaria in 1868 and went up from 71 to 83 in 1868 and then to 127 in March 1870. This was an indication of a definite improvement in the sanitary condition of Krishnagar.

The History of the College in this era cannot be concluded without some reference to the observations made by certain members of the teaching staff who had a large share in the making of the institution. One was Principal Lobb who was in charge of the College from 1870—1874. He was a man who held rather conservative views on education and opposed not only mass education but was even against giving the people technical education as he thought the Indians had no need of British assistance to make them industrious or skilful. "Education," writes Principal Lobb, "is a boon which should be sought for by and not rudely thrust upon a people."⁴³ He also

commented on the dangers of State-fostered education in these words—"The great danger of State-fostered education is that a large class is created which refuses to live by productive labour and he cites the case of lawyers as a class whom he calls "Vampires whose appetite grows with enormous rapidity when they have been nurtured in our English Schools." As for education of the Muhammadans, he thus observed in another letter:⁴⁴ "I am inclined to place them in the bulk of schools and colleges on precisely the same footing as the Hindus and Christians, though concessions to Muhammadan sentiment might be met by founding a few special schools and reserving the Hughli College and Calcutta Madrasah for them." On another occasion he wrote: "Higher and secondary education, say my informants of the district, should be given through English and not through the Vernacular. There should be a systematic recognition of Arabic and Persian Literature. Muhammadans according to them would be quite willing to accept Western Education if it were rendered suitable to their wants. They are fully alive to the loss which they have incurred by holding themselves aloof from the intellectual movement of late years."⁴⁵ Though Muhammadan opinion was in favour of English as the medium of higher and secondary education, a renowned educationist like Professor Umesh Chandra Dutt held a different view and suggested as early as 1873 that the medium of teaching Mathematics, History and Geography should be the vernacular but "that is impossible unless the Calcutta University changes its present attitude of insisting upon English as the medium of its answers even at the Entrance Examination."⁴⁶

In reply to the Lieutenant-Governor's Minute on "Education in Government schools, dated 4th December 1871, Principal Lobb criticised again in his dogmatic way the utility of certain subjects in the educational course of schools.⁴⁷ "The introduction of Sanskrit in the collegiate course was a great mistake. Not a minute should be lost in expelling that pretentious and profitless study called Philosophy. History should be abandoned as an independent subject. The Bengali mind in its present stage is essentially unhistorical. As to *Vernacular*, it ought to be to the Young Hindoo of Bengal when he learns English, what "English" is to the Young Briton when he learns Latin and Greek. I should like to see swept away ruthlessly, in the case of all our general Government colleges, every study which does not conduce to the main end of forming efficient agents for assisting the ruling power in its task of carrying on the work of Government in this country."

Few Educationists of to-day will agree with these conclusions of Principal Lobb. Ten years later, the Education Commission of 1882 urged that Elementary Education had the first claim on the State and the policy of the Government in the next period lay not in the withdrawal of its responsibilities from the realm of Education but in the assumption of greater control and supervision over its many spheres embracing not only general education in all its stages but also industrial and technical education.

CHAPTER IV.

(1875—1905.)

The College entered on a new period of its existence when the B.A. classes were restored by Sir Richard Temple in 1875 and the College was re-established on its original footing with the subscribed endowment of Rs. 40,000 by the Nadia public. High hopes were entertained about the future of the institution, now that it was raised to a First Grade College, once again. The Third Year Class was opened in January 1876 and the Fourth Year Class, a year later. The roll strength of the College went up from 64 in 1876 to 114 in May 1877. Two extra lecturers were appointed¹, one in Philosophy and the other in Physical Science, and the College came to have a teaching staff of six members with Mr. Lethbridge as Principal, Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt as Professor of History, Babu Nakuleswar Banerjee as Professor of Sanskrit, Sj. Barada Prosad Ghosh as Professor of Mathematics and Physics, Babu Ambika Charan Sen in the Chemistry Department and Babu Baranasi Roy as Professor of Law. The first Principal of this period was Mr. Lethbridge who took his Honours Degree from Oxford in June 1863 and was appointed to the Education Department in 1868. He served Krishnagar College as Principal from June 1874 till the end of March 1877 except for the period of his leave of absence for six months from 2nd May to 2nd November 1875 when Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt officiated in his place. He was followed by a number of able Principals. Mr. Rowe was Principal from May 1877 to March 1879. Mr. Mann became the permanent head of the institution in January 1883, after a series of changes in Principalship with four having officiated successively in place of Mr. Rowe, Messrs. Paulson, George Watt, G. A. Stock, J. A. Martin. Then came Messrs. S. C. Hill in 1887, W. Billing in March 1890, W. B. Livingstone in July 1897 who died at Krishnagar on the 30th September 1898 and was succeeded by Babu Jyoti Bhushan Bhaduri, Professor of Physics and Chemistry, who continued as Principal of Krishnagar College till the end of 1906. Messrs. Rowe and Billing were both excellent disciplinarians and did a great deal to improve the athletic activities as well as the general tone of the College. Mr. Billing, though a graduate of the Calcutta University and originally a member of the Provincial Service, officiated for eight years in the Higher Service as Principal of Krishnagar College. "His management of the College is said to have been marked by a very creditable degree of success and he is reported to be a good teacher and an excellent disciplinarian."²

The College staff was weakened in 1873 when after the abolition of the B.A. classes in Krishnagar College, two of the European members of the staff, Professors Wilson and Martin, were transferred from this College. Their places were never again filled up by men from the Superior Service and in 1875, the Government sanctioned two lecturers only on a salary of Rs. 150—10—250 to fill up their places when the B.A. classes were restored at the end of 1875.³ In 1883 the College lost the services of one of her most distinguished pupils and teachers when Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt retired after an unbroken connection with Krishnagar College from 1867 up to 1881. Next year it came to lose the services of two other members of the teaching staff—Babu Nakuleswar Banerjee, Professor of Sanskrit, through his appointment in the Subordinate Executive Service and Professor Ambika Charan Sen of the Chemistry Department who, on his return from England after a distinguished career in the Cirencester Agricultural College, joined the Civil Service. In 1893, the College teaching staff was composed of Principal

Billing and seven other members, one of whom was Babu Debendra Nath Bose, Professor of English, who subsequently became Principal of the College.⁴ Five years later, when Principal Livingstone was in charge, the staff strength was the same but one noticeable change was the appointment of a Law lecturer. The teaching work was not specialised as at present and professors were, as a rule, expected to teach not only their own subjects but also to combine in their lecture work such a curious assortment as History with Chemistry and Physics or Mathematics. This had been the customary practice since 1876. Professor Barada Prosad Ghosh had to teach Logic in the First Year Class in addition to Physics and Chemistry in the "Third Year"—while Babu Ambika Charan Sen had to teach History besides his own subject, Chemistry, in the First and Second Year classes.⁵ In 1893 another Professor, B. L. Mukherjee, had to teach three subjects—Chemistry, Physics and History. Occasionally, part of the school work even was done by members of the College staff, as in 1876, when Professor Umesh Chandra Dutt devoted ten hours per week to the teaching of English in the Entrance Class in addition to his own duties at the College, and Professor Nakuleswar Banerjee of the Sanskrit Department taught Sanskrit in the Entrance Class six hours a week. This readjustment of work between the school and the College was possible through the undivided control of the Principal over both branches of the institution and their teaching staff. The restoration of the B.A. classes in 1875 not only raised the staff strength of the College but also made the school more popular. Within a year, the number of boys in the school swelled from 210 on the 31st March 1874 to 372 in 1875, and the number of Moslem students rose from one in 1874 to fifty-four on the 31st March 1875. Two new masters on a pay of Rs. 80 and Rs. 70 per month had to be appointed and a teacher of Persian and Urdu was also engaged under Government Orders of 26th May 1875. In 1879 the teaching strength of the school was eleven teachers, one Moulvi and two Pandits. There were now three clerks for the routine work of the school and College and the Head Clerk was also a Librarian in addition to his own duties, on a pay of Rs. 35 per month.

The restoration of the B.A. classes in 1875 led to an increase in the roll strength of the College from 64 in 1876 to 114 in 1877, when as many as 62 boys were enrolled in the First Year Class. The number fell again to 79 in 1879 and showed a further drop to 53 in 1884. This gradual decline in the roll strength was due partially to the unsatisfactory University results of the College. In 1878 only 20 out of 35 students, 11 out of 38, 2 out of 13 and 1 out of 3 passed in the Entrance, F.A., B.A. and M.A. examinations of the University, respectively. In 1883-84, only 8 out of 17 passed in F.A. A few years later under Principal Hill, the Arts Course was introduced in 1887-88⁶ with a new Lecturer in Philosophy and the roll strength rose to 71 but for a number of years—almost up to the end of nineties—the number of students in the College hardly showed any appreciable rise as the Government was not in favour of retaining its management and recommended in 1887 on the basis of the report of the Education Commission of 1882-83 that the Municipality of Krishnagar should take over the administration of the College with a Government grant-in-aid. But this offer was not accepted by the Municipality and it only raised alarm in the mind of the Nadia public about the future of the institution. They were not relieved till the Lieutenant-Governor assured them that in view of their promised and realised donations (a sum of Rs. 7,000 was raised by public subscriptions towards the Endowment Fund of the College in 1893) the status of Krishnagar College would remain unaltered. In 1905, the College roll strength rose to 108, an index of renewed public confidence in the institution.

The University results of the College were rather unsatisfactory during these thirty years of its existence (1875—1905) as we can see from a rapid glance at the chart below :—

In commenting on the bad result of the College (only 5 out of 28 passed in F.A. in 1878), the Principal ascribed the large failure to the new rules of the Calcutta University which allowed all candidates who had kept their terms for two years to appear at the University Examination. The New University Regulations of 1885 also made the examinations stiffer and accounted for the unsatisfactory results of the College. There was some improvement in the result after the introduction of the compulsory percentage system in 1889 by the University which insisted on attendance of 66 per cent. of College lectures on each subject as obligatory for all candidates appearing at the University examination.⁷ Inspite of the large failures of this period, a number of students gained individual distinction in their academic career.⁸ In 1882-83 Babu Bidhu Bhusan Goswami stood 11th in order of merit in F.A. and subsequently became Professor of Sanskrit at the Krishnagar College and in the same year the late Rai Bahadur Biswambhar Roy, Government Pleader of Krishnagar, took his B.I. In 1885, Babu Lalit Kumar Banerjee topped the list of successful candidates in F.A. and eventually became Professor of Bangabasi College. Four passed with Honours in B.A. in 1893 of whom the first was the late Rai Bahadur Rakhal Raj Biswas, I.E.S., *ex*-Principal of Krishnagar College, who stood first in order of merit in Mathematics and the other three were—

Babu Upendra Lal Banerjee—who stood first in Physics and became a high official in the office of the Accountant-General, Bengal.

Babu Atul Chandra Ganguly—who stood 13th in Physics and became Professor of Ravenshaw College, Cuttack.

Babu Satish Chandra Acharya—who stood 2nd in order of merit in Sanskrit and became Principal of Sanskrit College, Calcutta.

In 1899 Mr. B. K. Lahiri, the well-known Bar.-at-Law, graduated from this College with Second Class Honours in English and the two brothers of the well-known Sarkar family of Krishnagar, Babu Biman Behari Sarkar of the Judicial Service and Babu Benode Behari Sarkar of the Bengal Civil Service passed their F.A. examination with great distinction from Krishnagar College and stood second and fourth, respectively, in order of merit in 1902 and 1904. But the most well-known student of Krishnagar College of this era who attained great literary fame in Bengal was the late poet and dramatist Mr. D. L. Roy who passed his Entrance and F.A. examinations from this College in 1878 and 1880 with a scholarship but subsequently graduated from Hughli.

The B Course or the Science Course was the only branch of study accessible to students of Krishnagar College going up for their B.A. examination after 1875. In 1887 the "A" or Arts Course in B.A. was

introduced with a new Lecturer in Philosophy. It appears from the distribution of work among the various members of the College staff that the following subjects were taught in B.A.⁹ :—

English with Honours, Mental and Moral Science, Second Language with Honours, Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry with Honours.

In F.A., the boys of Krishnagar College could take up English, Mathematics, Second Language, History, Logic and Chemistry in 1878, Physics was included in 1889.

Professors, as a rule, did not specialise in one particular subject but combined more than one subject in their teaching work, as we have already seen. The number of lecture hours was also heavy and even the Principal of the College had to do more than his share of the teaching work in addition to his administrative duties. In 1893 Principal Billing taught English in the B.A. classes and did eighteen hours of lecture work per week.

The College Endowment Fund raised by the public of Nadia as a condition for the restoration of the B.A. classes in Krishnagar College reached the figure of Rs. 41,629 as realised subscriptions in April 1876 of which Rs. 36,377 had been paid into the Nadia Treasury to the credit of the "Endowment Fund".¹⁰ The Government even went so far as to announce that it would pay all expenses incurred under the "Restoration" on receiving as some set-off the interest of the Endowment Fund and the Fee-receipts of the classes.¹¹ In 1877 the Principal intimated that the sum of Rs. 41,893-8 had been collected and deposited in the local treasury and the Government had consented to the amount being placed in the hands of trustees chosen by the subscribers who were¹²—

In August 1878 Rs. 40,500 of the "Endowment Fund" was invested in "Government securities", the balance of Rs. 458-4-9 being deposited in the District Savings Bank in the name of the Collector of Nadia. Many years later in 1897, the Principal of the College threw additional light on the position of the Endowment Fund when he stated that the sum of Rs. 41,435 had been invested by the Board of Trustees in Government 4½ per cent. Securities which were in the custody of the Controller-General. The net *annual interest* of the Fund had been credited since 1884 in the books of the Education Department. A further sum of Rs. 7,000 was raised by public subscriptions in 1893 and invested in "Government Securities" for Rs. 6,500 which was added to the College Endowment Fund" of Rs. 40,000. Besides the "Endowment Fund" the College came to enjoy the gift of a few scholarships. Guru Gobinda Pattadar was the first winner of "The Temple Scholarship", awarded by Babu Naffar Chandra Palchoudhury, of Rs. 240 for standing first from Krishnagar College in the University B.A. examination.¹³ Two silver medals also came to be annually awarded by Babu Jogesh Chandra Banerjee—"The Bhava Chandra Medal" to the best F.A. candidate from

Bengal. In the Quinquennium of 1895—1900 a scholarship known as “*Garret Scholarship*” of Rs. 8 per month, tenable for two years, came to be awarded to the best successful F.A. candidate of the College every second year provided he continued his B.A. studies in the same institution—by Babu Ram Mohan Mallik, a Zaminder of Meherpur. The first recipient of this scholarship was Mr. B. K. Lahiri, the well-known Bar-at-Law who graduated from this College.¹⁴

The Mohini Mohan Roy Prize Fund¹⁵ was established in 1883 with a prize of Rs. 80 in books to be awarded every year to the student who most successfully passed the B.A. examination with Honours from this College. Out of the interest of the accumulated cash balance (in July 1903 it was Rs. 560-1-8) two stipends of Rs. 4 and Rs. 3 each were created to help deserving poor students. The Smith and Macdonell Prize Fund was created in 1904 by Babu Syama Charan Maitra out of which a prize of Rs. 8 was awarded to the student who most successfully passed I.A. from Krishnagar College. There was also the “*Mohsin Fund*”. In 1893, the Mohsin grant for the College was Rs. 600 out of which Rs. 180 went for part-payment of Maulvi’s pay and Rs. 420 was paid to cover two-thirds of the fees of the Moslem pupils of the College. Twenty-two out of 27 students enjoyed the benefit of the Fund in the School and College sections in 1893.¹⁶

The College Library retained its importance and was used by the residents of Krishnagar, both European and Indian, in 1876 but in the Principal’s opinion the value of the Library for purposes of advanced study and modern research had been greatly diminished by the rule that books published in England could be purchased only through the Secretary of State for India, which meant enormous delay attending an indent. A new catalogue was prepared and 204 volumes were added to the Library in 1879. The post of the Librarian was abolished within a few years of its restoration in January 1875 and the Head Clerk had to act as a Librarian in addition to his own duties.

The need of a small laboratory with Chemistry became urgent as soon as the science course was introduced after the restoration of the B.A. classes in 1875 and taken by the first batch of Third Year students but for three years they had to carry on their work without any science apparatus. In 1879, a sum of Rs. 11,000 was sanctioned for the new laboratory for Physics and Chemistry and the work was finished in February 1880.¹⁷ Many years later, in March 1903, the College laboratory was remodelled at a cost of over Rs. 10,000 to prepare students for the B.Sc. examination and the Principal sought the help of the Director for affiliation of the College in B.Sc. from June 1903 but it could not be obtained till 1908. The Chemical laboratory was extended in 1904 by the addition of rooms for practical work, gas works and water connections. The post of a Laboratory Assistant was also created in 1903.

College Hostels.—The Hindu Hostel established in June 1876 contained 21 boarders on 31st March 1879. In 1897, the number was 34 but a few years later in 1902 the roll strength of boarders went up to 55 and an additional house had to be rented.¹⁸ The school and College students lived in a joint hostel up to 1908 and the Gymnastic teacher, who was the Hostel Superintendent, was allowed free board and lodging with no fixed allowance but only a capitation tax of eight annas per boarder. The monthly fee

rate of students in the hostel was Rs. 6-8 per month.¹⁹ The Hindu Hostel changed its habitat many times until it was removed to "Bagadanga House" (at present the Don Bosco School of the Catholic Mission) in 1910 where it remained till the construction of the Government Hindu Hostel in 1927.

There was no organised Common Room life till 1905. Between 1888—1892 the College had, however, a Debating Club with Rev. Butler of the C.M.S. School as its President. In 1903 there was a regular "Students' Union" with meetings every week under the chairmanship of a professor, and also a "Book Club" for professors and teachers who subscribed to a number of English Magazines and passed them on to the students after perusal.²⁰

Games and sports gained an impetus in Krishnagar College when Mr. Rowe became Principal in 1877. He infused new life into College Cricket, and also Gymnastics for which a lump Government grant was obtained and an instructor was appointed. Under the guidance of Babu Surendra Nath Banerjee, the "Gymnasium" became popular. Gymnastics was made compulsory by Principal Billing for all students who did not participate in other games. In December 1891, there was an inter-collegiate gymnastic competition between Hughli and Krishnagar in which Babu Jyotibhusan Chatterjee, B.L., a member of the Local Bar, won recognition.

The game of Cricket whose origin can be traced back to 1856 when Krishnagar College team won its first cricket victory against Hughli College, gained also a new impetus under Principal Rowe who got together a fairly good Cricket team in 1878 and arranged a number of matches which were played even in the hot season. In 1882, there was an interesting Cricket Match between Dacca and Krishnagar Colleges on the 6th and 7th December played in the Calcutta Eden Gardens, whose expenses were borne by Sir R. Thomson, the Lieutenant-Governor. It was won by the Dacca team. Ten years later, there was another match between Hughli and Krishnagar which the home team won owing to the excellent bowling of Babu Kshitish Chandra Mukherjee, a member of the Local Bar, whose father Babu Ram Chandra Mukherjee was responsible for the first Cricket victory of the College against Hughli in 1856.

The game of "Football" was introduced in the College in the time of Principal Billing who, in one of his letters to the Director, refers to the enthusiasm of the boys for Football and Cricket games.²¹

There was also provision for "Wrestling" in the College compound with a paid Wrestler to train up boys in the time of Principal Watt, the famous botanist in the eighties.

The College Athletic Club was under the control of the "The College Games Committee" which consisted of the Principal, two senior teachers, the Head Master, one member of the teaching staff, the Gymnastic Master (who was Secretary and Treasurer of the Committee) and the Chairman of the Sub-Committee which was composed of ten representatives of the students. Three were to form a quorum. Every student (of both school and college) had to pay an athletic fee of six annas once every half-year in January and June for the upkeep of the club. Games were to be played in the College compound under the general superintendence of the Gymnastic Master. These rules had been introduced by Principal Billing on his own authority by an order of 12th January 1897.²² But inspite of this compulsory levy, the students worried the public for subscriptions to their football

and cricket club and it is amusing to read in one of the letters of the Principal that the European clergyman of the station pointed out to him the rudeness of one of his College students in opening the "Jheel-meel" of his bath room when he was having his bath but took it in a good humour and said, "It would have been ten times worse if he had seen my wife instead." The same Principal Mr. Livingstone who died at Krishnagar in 1898, apparently saw the need, after this, of improving the manners of his students and wrote a "Manual of good manners" for their benefit.

The general discipline of the College must have been satisfactory under the regime of Principals like Rowe and Billing who were both excellent disciplinarians. There is a very interesting letter from Principal Rowe to Mr. A. W. Croft, officiating Director, which throws light on the kinds of indiscipline prevailing among students of Krishnagar College at the end of the "Seventies".²³ He speaks of three kinds of indiscipline, *first* leaving the class room during working hours on the slightest pretext and not returning at all so that there were seldom fewer than some twenty boys to be seen wandering about the College corridors, *secondly*, walls of the class rooms being scribbled over with drawings and writings of a grossly indecent character, and *thirdly* the general spirit of dishonesty in College and school as regards cheating at examinations which had taken various forms—of removing admit cards from the desks of the University examinations by bribing the College daftari, of exchanging an answer-paper by bribing a chaprasi and even substituting one's answer-paper in the course of examination by the examiner. In one such case, Principal Rowe prosecuted two boys of the Second Class of the Collegiate School criminally for abetment of theft of answer-papers for which he became very unpopular but he maintained his firm attitude and justified it in these words—"my severity following on a rule so lenient and amiable will doubtless render the College unpopular but if, with even reduced numbers, we can induce a healthier regard for decency and truth, I do not think the real well-being of the College will have been injured." Subsequently on the strength of a petition signed by a large number of the more influential residents of the town like Rai Bahadur Jadu Nath Roy, Babu Ram Tanu Lahiri, Babu Prasanna Chandra Roy, Head Master of A. V. School, and Babu Kartik Chandra Roy, Manager of Nadia State, Mr. Rowe readmitted these two boys whom he had punished. This joint representation had been accompanied by a petition for mercy by Babu Girish Chandra Sanyal on behalf of his son.—Bidhu Bhusan Sanyal written in Bengali in the peculiar style of the time. It is quoted below²⁴:

The case of one of the teachers also—Moulvi M. Rahman—was reviewed for disciplinary action by Principal Billing who suspended him from duty for acts of unbecoming familiarity towards his pupils and he was eventually transferred to the Hughli Collegiate School in August 1891.²⁵

The School Department showed a remarkable rise in its roll strength from 210 in 1874 to 362 boys in May 1878 but the result of the Entrance Examination was not very satisfactory in 1877 when only 16 boys out of 46 candidates were successful with three only in the first division. Throughout this period, the school formed an integral part of the College and every part of its organisation—The teaching staff, supervision of classes and their general work; life of the school boarders; the athletic activities—were as much subject to the direction and control of the Principal as the academic and extra-academic activities of the College.

The Library, the playing-grounds and the Gymnasium were shared in common by students of both the school and College. In 1903 Babu Nalini Mohan Sanyal, now the octogenarian, Ph.D. of the Calcutta University, succeeded Babu Sagar Chandra Chakraverti on his retirement as Head Master of the school which maintained its unbroken connection with the College and occupied the same building till the end of 1907. It was separated early in 1908 when it was shifted to the rented house belonging to the Khans of Ula (1st January 1908) but the management of the Krishnagar Collegiate School still largely rested with the Principal of the College.²⁶

The College Building after the quadrennial repairs was in very fair order in 1878. In 1897 it, however, suffered considerable damage from the great Earthquake and the verandahs were dismantled. The College Laboratory was remodelled in 1903. In 1906, the school occupied the western half of the main building with the Central Hall separating it from the eastern or College block. The Hall was divided into two rooms by means of a movable teakwood partition wall.²⁷ A very large portion of the land was planted with trees. The amount of lands in possession of the College and the *nature of their tenure was the subject of an official enquiry from the Nadia Collectorate** in this period and the Principal forwarded copies of certain communications which indicated that a *Deed of Conveyance* of certain lands presented by the Maharaja of Nadia was lodged with the Collector for safe custody on the 21st July 1860²⁸, viz.:—

Two other questions—the municipal assessment of the College building and the use of certain rooms of the College by the Principal for his residence—formed subjects of official correspondence. The Principal in his letter to the Executive Engineer of Nadia Rivers Division enquired whether the municipal assessment of Rs. 411-14 a year on the building—including the latrine tax of Rs. 110—was reasonable.²⁹ In 1903, he forwarded to the Chairman of Krishnagar Municipality a regular contingent bill for Rs. 123-9-6 on account of municipal tax for the College buildings and gardens for the quarter ending 30th September 1903 but the municipal service to the College was unsatisfactory and the Principal could not help complaining to the Chairman that the municipal mehtar did not clean the college latrines regularly and was most irregular in his duties.

As for use of a portion of the College building by the Principal for his residence, Principal Billing wrote to the Director on 5th December 1890 explaining that permission to reside in the College premises had first been given to Principal S. Lobb in 1873 in a special order, dated 2nd August 1873, authorising him to reside in the College *rent-free* until such time as he drew more than Rs. 1,000 per month. Since then, the principle of residence within the College building by successive Principals had been followed. Mr. Billing received the formal permission of the Director on 23rd May 1890 to occupy four rooms of the College for his own use.

CHAPTER V.

(1905—1925.)

The next phase in the history of Krishnagar College opened with important changes in the organisation of the University of Calcutta. These were initiated by Lord Curzon who gave a new stimulus to Higher Education by placing in authoritative control over the University the best intellects and agencies that could be enlisted in the task. A new Senate and Syndicate came into office and pressure was exerted at every point by the University to induce colleges to better equip their laboratories and raise their staff for the sake of more efficient teaching. Government deputed Mr. Jackson as a special officer to make recommendations about its own colleges and his report on the future working of Krishnagar College is an interesting survey of the institution at this stage.¹ He spoke of the limited accommodation of the College with only three rooms and the central hall for use, of the decrease in the number of third and fourth year students who were being drawn away to Berhampore, the absence of any residential hostel near the College and suggested that all mofussil Government colleges should concentrate on the Pass courses rather than Honours and M.A. work. He also recommended the establishment of a *Tutorial System* in the Colleges as likely to be of greater benefit than the multiplication of lectures. "A sounder view to take in this matter is that the only part of education which is really of value is the part which consists in training a student to master his own difficulties. Lectures should be few and tutorial classes may be numerous with advantage." In order to relieve the congestion of the building, Mr. Jackson suggested the removal of the Collegiate School to a separate building and the construction of a separate house for the Principal, which would thus release plenty of accommodation in the College building for College classes (Arts and Science). The number of students also, he suggested, could be improved if the B.Sc. course were allowed at the Krishnagar College which was better equipped for the teaching of Physics and Chemistry than any other mofussil college both in accommodation and apparatus.

Some of Mr. Jackson's recommendations were carried out by Government. There was a reorganisation of Krishnagar College in accordance with the scheme of Mr. Earle, I.C.S., who succeeded Sir A. Pedler on his retirement as the new Director of Public Instruction. The collegiate school was completely separated from the College and finally removed to the rented house in the town belonging to the "Khans of Ula" on the 1st January 1908. The tutorial classes were started in July 1907. The College staff was strengthened, the M.A. and B.L. classes were abolished and the B.L. department was transferred to the University Law College which was to be set up in Calcutta in July 1908. The public of Nadia had already made a move for erecting the new College Hostel for Hindu boarders in April 1906 when a special Committee with the District Magistrate as Chairman was formed to collect subscriptions for the purpose.² The sum of Rs. 5,563 was realised as subscriptions up to June 1908. Affiliation in I.Sc. and B.Sc. standards was also obtained in June 1908 and Honours affiliation in B.A. Sanskrit, a year later.

These changes led to an increase in the roll strength of the College and the number went up from 100 in 1907-1908 to 148 in 1911-12 and rose to 216 on the 31st July 1914. The number would have risen higher still but for the unfavourable position of this College in the range of affiliations as compared with the sister institution of Berhampore. Krishnagar College

had no Political Economy in B.A. Pass and no Honours affiliation in English or Science (B.Sc.) while Berhampore College had all these affiliations and some more. The position was greatly improved when the College received additional affiliations in Persian (I.A. and B.A. Pass), Philosophy and Economics (B.A. Pass) and Honours in English and Mathematics, in 1918.³ The roll strength again went up from 216 in 1914 to 281 on the 31st March of 1919-20. By religion and caste, the largest number of this year came from the non-Brahmin groups and was 152 while there were 15 Muhammadan students and only 1 Christian. In 1921-22, the number of students fell to 204 on account of the Non-co-operation Movement which affected all colleges.

The University results were fairly good and the percentage of pass in I.A. and B.A. Pass as well as on the corresponding Science side was on the whole satisfactory, showing a fifty per cent. pass on the average. The I.Sc. results in 1919 and 1920 were brilliant—18 and 20 appeared in these two successive years and all passed. In I.A. 41 appeared in 1920 and 37 passed. The B.A. result in the same year showed a cent per cent success. Thirty-five appeared and none failed. Compared with these records, the University results of the College before the introduction of the new regulations were not half so flattering—21 out of 41 candidates passing in F.A. and 7 out of 14 in B.A. in 1906-1907.

This discrepancy in result was to some extent due to the stiffer standard of the University before the New Regulations in June 1907. Individually, however, some of the students of Krishnagar College showed a brilliant record in the early years of this period. Mr. Birendra Kumar Basu, I.C.S., stood eighth in order of merit in F.A. in 1906. Mr. S. N. Modak, another I.C.S., topped the list in the same examination in 1909 and received a Gold Medal worth Rs. 100 awarded by Babu Debendra Nath Sinha Roy, Zeminder of Nakasipara, for his brilliant success. Mr. Jyotish Chandra De, now a Professor with a London University Degree, was the first to pass with Honours in Sanskrit from this College in 1913. During the Quinquennium (1917-1922), 13 students passed with Honours while 30 secured distinctions in B.A. and B.Sc. The last B.I. examination at Krishnagar College was held in 1908, in which four candidates appeared and two were successful.

The new University Regulations came into force in June 1907. The M.A. and B.I. classes of Krishnagar College were abolished and the teaching work was now confined to the Intermediate and Degree courses. With the separation of the school in 1908, it passed out of the Principal's control. In 1908, the subjects taught at Krishnagar College in I.A. were—

English.	History.
Bengali.	Mathematics.
Sanskrit.	Physics.

Chemistry.

Two new subjects were subsequently included in the I.A. Course—Logic in 1912 and Persian five years later.

The B.A. Course at Krishnagar in 1908 included—

English (Pass and Honours).	Mathematics.
Bengali.	Physics.
Sanskrit.	Chemistry.

In 1912, History was added in B.A. as a new subject but English Honours was dropped, and five years later, three additional subjects were included in the B.A. Pass Course at Krishnagar College—

Political Economy,
Philosophy, and
Persian,

with Honours in English and Mathematics.

The teaching staff in the early years was 12 including the Principal—five Professors, four Lecturers and two Laboratory Assistants. Two Lecturer-Demonstrators in Physics and Chemistry were appointed in 1907 and 1909, a Lecturer in Sanskrit in 1907 (converted into a Professor in 1911) and another in History in 1910. In 1918-19 five additional posts were created for Krishnagar College:—

a Professor and a Lecturer of English,
a Professor and a Lecturer in Philosophy,
a Lecturer in Persian,

and a year later, a Professor of Economics was also appointed. By the end of March 1922, the Instructing staff of the College came to be 21 with the Gymnastic teacher—as compared with the low figure of eight members only on the College staff in 1898. The names of many on the staff of 1922 are familiar to us. Some of them left the College not long ago and a few are still with us—(1) Babu Ramendra Nath Ghosh, Professor of Physics, (2) Babu Bhabesh Chandra Banerjee, *ex-Principal* of the College and sometime Professor of Sanskrit, (3) Babu Narendra Nath Chatterjee, Professor of English and late Vice-Principal of Krishnagar College, (4) Babu Satya Saran Kahali, Lecturer in English, (5) Babu Bidhu Bhushan Sengupta, Lecturer in Logic, (6) Maulvi M. Ahmad, Lecturer in Persian and now Professor of the same subject at Rajshahi, (7) Babu Banku Behari Pandit, Lecturer-Demonstrator in Chemistry, (8) Babu Bibhuti Bhushan Bhattacharyya, Additional Laboratory Assistant, and (9) Babu Rup Chand Dafadar, Games Master.

There was also a succession of Principals in this period. Krishnagar College had as many as four Principals up to the time of Mr. R. N. Gilchrist, M.A., in 1916:—

Rai Bahadur Jyoti Bhushan Bhaduri served till the end of 1906.

Babu Sashi Bhushan Dutt from 2nd January 1907 till 16th April 1908.

Babu Debendra Nath Basu retired in 1909.

Babu Satish Chandra De from November 1909 up to 1916 almost without a break.

For the rest of the period (1916—1925) Principal Gilchrist (1916—1921) and Mr. Egerton Smith (1921—1928) were in charge of the institution. Two Principals in particular—Babu Satish Chandra De and Mr. Gilchrist—had an important share in moulding the life of the institution. Principal De took special interest in the moral welfare of his students and sought their improvement not only by instructive lectures but also by the promotion of close social contact between the staff on one hand, and students and their guardians on the other. In speaking of his students, Mr. De was proud to say that “in the days when sedition was rampant in the land, the students of Krishnagar College always proved loyal and law-abiding.” Mr. Gilchrist also was a very energetic Principal and in his time the College made great progress in every department when new affiliations were obtained, the teaching staff was greatly strengthened, larger library and laboratory grants were made available and new constructions were undertaken.

The non-teaching staff of the College was small with two clerks, one Librarian, one Laboratory Assistant, one Mechanic and one Compounder of the Chemical Laboratory in 1910. The menial staff was composed in 1908 of one laboratory bearer, two bearers, two water bearers, two daftaris, two sweepers, three malis, two durwans, and one Principal's chaprasi. The menials were ill-paid, the laboratory bearer getting only Rs. 8 per month—the highest pay among all the menials.

Two important changes were made in the administration of the College in 1908-1909—(1) the appointment of a Governing Body, and (2) the establishment of the College Council. The Governing Body was at first composed of the District Judge as President (*ex-officio*), the Principal as Vice-President and Secretary (*ex-officio*) and a senior Professor as member.⁴ A fourth non-official member was added in December 1915, and the Maharaja of Nadia joined the Governing Body in July 1916 as the member representing the Hindu community. Five years later, Nawabzada Syed Ali Ashraf was taken as the Muhammadan member. In 1924-25, Sir Azizul Haque, then a Member of the Local Bar, joined it as the representative of the Muhammadan community. Besides passing monthly accounts, the Governing Body considered various matters relating to the welfare of the College and met on an average ten times a year between 1917—1922.

The College Council was composed in 1908-1909 of all members of the staff and met several times in the year to consider the results of students of the College both for annual promotions and for being sent up for the University Examinations. It acted also as an advisory body to the Principal in matters of College organisation and discipline.

The net expenditure of the College was approximately Rs. 18,380 while the receipts amounted to Rs. 5732 in 1878. In 1908, the net expenditure went up to Rs. 23,339 and rose to Rs. 27,395 in 1912. The annual receipts from fees, fines and endowments, etc., almost doubled since 1878 and amounted to Rs. 10,391. The total cost of educating each student per year gradually fell from Rs. 363 in 1908 to Rs. 282 in 1912. This was due to the steady rise in the number of students from 100 to 148 in the quinquennium of 1907—1912, and the increase in the net expenditure of the College on account of the bigger staff and allotments as between 1908—1912 did not adversely affect the cost per capita. In 1918 the receipts of the College reached the figure of Rs. 18,745 while the net expenditure (*i.e.*, expenses of the College covered by receipts from Provincial Revenues) was Rs. 36,863. Five years later it rose to Rs. 59,276 while the receipts, viz., Rs. 21,708 showed only a small rise in the income of the College since 1918.⁵ Thus the total cost of educating each student per year rose from Rs. 294 in 1918 to Rs. 358 in 1921-1922 and as the Quinquennial Report of 1917—1922 shows, it was due to the decrease in the number of students and increase in the pay of the teaching staff on account of a number of promotions.

This high cost of education per head (it was Rs. 365 in 1908) began to raise doubts in the mind of the Government as to the desirability of keeping up a Government College in Krishnagar at such a high cost unless the roll strength could be raised from 100 to at least twice the number. A Committee composed of the Commissioner of the Presidency Divison, the Divisional Inspector of Schools, Dr. Deva Prosad Sarbadhikary and Mr. Murari Mohan Ghosh, went into the question of changing the status of the College and finally recommended that it should continue as a Government institution subject to certain conditions as to local support. The

Government agreed two years later to waive these conditions as to local support and to maintain the College as a Government Institution.⁹

In 1920, the College received another alarm from the Government about the abolition of its B.A. and B.Sc. classes, upon which there was a vast gathering in the Krishnagar Town Hall with the Maharaja of Nadia in the Chair to protest vehemently against such a proposal.¹⁰ It even went so far as to suggest the creation of a Department of Oriental Studies in Krishnagar College with the help of the Pandits of Nadabwip. His Excellency the Governor of Bengal, Lord Ronaldshay, paid a visit to Krishnagar on the 6th July 1920 and assured the public that the College would retain its first-grade status. A few years later in 1923 when the Bengal Retrenchment Committee recommended the deprovincialisation of all Arts Colleges in Bengal (except Presidency and Bethune Colleges) the Government did not carry out its recommendations but decided to retain one Government College in each Division, though the College fees for each course of studies were raised. In commenting on this, the Editor of the College Magazine (September 1923) remarked "We must confess that this is the lesser of the two evils."

New Trust Funds were created in this period. One was the Livingstone Memorial Prize Fund¹¹ of Rs. 234-1-1 handed to the Director in January 1910 with a view to perpetuate the memory of the late Principal W. B. Livingstone who died in Krishnagar in 1898, by the award of an Annual Prize out of the interest, to the student obtaining the highest marks in the annual B.A. and B.Sc. examinations of the Third Year Class.

In 1916, Babu Debendra Nath Sinha Roy, Zamindar of Nakasipara, proposed endowing the College with 3½ per cent. Government Promissory Notes of the nominal value of Rs. 7,800 for three free-studentships at the College and one free-studentship at the attached Hindu Hostel. This was converted with approval of the Director of Public Instruction into Debendra Nath Sinha Roy Fund¹² whose income between 1917—1922 was Rs. 1,381-6-11 and expenditure out of the same was Rs. 1,023-4.

The old Trust Funds, viz., the "College Endowment Fund" which amounted to Rs. 75,100 in 1917, the "Mohini Mohan Roy Prize Fund" and "The Smith and Macdonell Prize Fund" continued to exist as in the past.

The Students Aid Fund was started in 1918 with the principal and four members of the staff to help the needy students of the College with books and fees. The students, however, were irregular in paying their Aid-Fund donations until the practice of a compulsory levy of one anna per student together with his monthly fees was introduced with the approval of the students in 1929.

The condition of the library improved considerably in 1909-1910. The number of volumes increased from 9,632 to 10,007 inclusive of the 565 volumes transferred to the Collegiate School and 478 volumes which were reported as hopelessly damaged or antiquated. The library grant was raised from Rs. 300 to Rs. 500 per annum and a whole-time Graduate librarian was appointed in April 1909.¹³ Fifty books on an average were issued to students every month for study at home and the books most in request were those on Bengali literature. A Reading Room was opened in March 1910 to enable students to read books of the library in the College. The Catalogue was thoroughly revised and reprinted in 1911. During the Quintenium (1917—1922) the College library came to have more than 12,000

volumes, and the average annual grant was Rs. 1,811 with several special grants in addition for the improvement of the library. The Annual Report of the year 1922-23 complains of the congestion of the library and inadequate accommodation both for readers and books, though the library grant was now raised to over Rs. 2,000 per year for books and periodicals, which included Journals like "Nature", "Chemical Society Journal", "Mind", "Quarterly Review", "Edinburgh Review", "Economic Journal", "Nation and Athnaeum" and "Journal of Education".

The laboratories in 1910 were in a fairly satisfactory condition. A lecture-theatre had been provided in 1908, the laboratory staff strengthened in 1909 by the addition of two Demonstrators and the laboratories had been extended and refitted between 1907-1912. The first batch of students who appeared in B.Sc. from Krishnagar College in March 1910 was only twelve. Even in 1916, the Principal complained that inspite of laboratory improvements the number of B.Sc. students was very small though it was difficult to find seats in the Calcutta Colleges. In the next Quinquennium (1917-1922) the laboratory grant was raised from Rs. 2,000 to Rs. 4,000 but the Great War created difficulties in the way of procuring apparatus and chemicals from Europe and thus greatly hampered the normal work of the College laboratories.

The School and College Hostels were not separated till June 1908. Two years later, the College Hostel was removed to a more commodious house. "The Bagadanga House", now a part of the "Don Bosco School." A member of the Instructing staff was appointed as the Superintendent of the Hostel in 1911 and there was an increase of boarders from 22 to 48 in 1911-1912. This Hostel had extensive grounds in a physically and morally healthy locality and the boarders lived a long way from the disreputable quarters of the town. Although it was large, it could not accommodate all the students who were without their guardians in the town and so the need for a larger Hostel was keenly felt. Even as early as April 1906, a non-official Committee had been formed with the District Magistrate as chairman and distinguished members of the public such as ex-Principal Umesh Chandra Dutt, Mr. Bipradas Palchoudhury, Zemindar of Mahesganj, and many leading lawyers of the town, with the object of collecting handsome donations for the new Hindu Hostel. More than Rs. 15,000 was realised in 1910 and the total raised by local effort finally came to Rs. 27,410, the whole amount being merged in the Endowment Fund together with the accruing interest.¹² In 1927 the new Hindu Hostel was at last completed at a cost of Rs. 86,700 and was formally opened on the 11th July by Maharaja Kaunish Chandra Roy Bahadur of Nadia before a distinguished gathering.¹³ It was a palatial two-storeyed building furnished with all necessary requisites. The Hostel became popular and had 64 boarders in the first year who paid a fixed mess charge of Rs. 11 and a seat rent of Rs. 2 each per month.

A Muhammadan Hostel was started in July 1915 with four boarders only and it interests us to note that the overflow of Hindu boarders was accommodated in one portion of the Muhammadan Hostel under the common supervision of the Moslem Superintendent.¹⁴ This Hostel was in a rented house for a long time in charge of a resident Superintendent and accommodated Muhammadan boarders of both the school and college, and it was only in 1936 that the Government Moslem Hostel, known as the Anderson Muslim Hostel, was formally opened on the 25th July before a distinguished gathering by Sir Azizul Haque, the then Education Minister of Bengal.

The College building—The Collegiate School was removed from the College building in January 1908 and a number of rooms in the Main Block were now made available for use of the Science Department of the College. The Chemistry Block together with six rooms of the Main Building was utilised for the work of Physics and Chemistry Departments. Five rooms of the Major Building were used as Class Rooms, two for the library, one as the Students' Reading Room, one as the Principal's room, one for the Professors and one as office. The Hall was not used as a class room but generally utilised for examinations, Durbars and similar functions.¹⁵

During the Quinquennium (1917—1921) the Northern Block, called the Annexe, was built with two rooms to which three more rooms were added later, a drinking water room was completed and a well was sunk in the flower garden of the College to remove the long-felt want of pure drinking water which had to be brought all these years from the well of the Collectorate.

The Principal, in his note appended to Mr. Jackson's report of February 1907, thus speaks of the general appearance of the College:—

"The compound of the College is not well kept. Two sweepers are utterly insufficient for keeping the compound free from leaves and rubbish. People—outsiders—to provide short cuts for themselves often break in through the hedge round the compound. The town abounds in monkeys which often invade the flower garden in front. These have to be guarded against. The land to the north—called the "garden"—is covered with jungle. This ought to be cleared. Lastly the present flower garden in front ought to be improved."

The Students' Common Room began its official existence in 1905 with an annual grant of Rs. 200 for purchase of journals. The "College Union" was a part of the Common Room and met once a fortnight under the chairmanship of a member of the staff. It held some interesting debates, as in December 1917 when subjects like "Literature *versus* Science as factors of liberal education" were discussed. The champions of Science carried the day but curiously enough none of the Science students spoke for the claims of Science. In 1924, the "College Union" was reorganised with a Secretary and an Assistant Secretary elected by the students.

The College Magazine with English, Bengali and Sanskrit contributions was started in 1908 under the name of "Life and Light". It was at first brought out as a manuscript issue every month. In July 1915 it was first printed and published as "The College Magazine", though the manuscript issue continued to exist for sometime as "A feeder-Magazine for the College" and was rechristened as "Arati" in 1920.

The College sent four students in 1908 to take part in the Recitation Competition held under the auspices of the Calcutta University and one of the competitors in Bengali received a medal. At the Inter-University Recitation Contest held by the University Institute in 1918, one of the competitors from Krishnagar College secured the first place in both Bengali and Sanskrit. In early days, the students of the College took part in "English plays". In 1907 Shakespeare's "Othello" was staged through the efforts of two college students—Mr. Moni Mohan Ghosh (now a retired Deputy Collector) and Mr. Dwigendra N. Chatterjee (a retired Head Master) and a year later in October, 1908, the students of the College gave a successful performance of Dr. Tagore's "Bisarjan" (বিসর্জন).

The students paid attention to different forms of "Physical Exercise" and played all kinds of games—football, cricket, tennis, badminton and hockey. In 1906, the College Football Team was strong enough to beat the "Bannu Team" from the Punjab and won the local "Purna Chandra Mitra Challenge

Cup" as well as the "Baker Tug-of-War Cup" awarded by Sir Edward Norman Baker, the Lieutenant-Governor, in 1910. Four years later, the Hockey Club was started and in 1921 Principal Egerton Smith introduced the Inter-class Football League Competition in which he himself played with the boys. There was an interesting Cricket Match—two years later, with the Town Club—in which Principal Smith and Professor Narendra Nath Chatterjee were the chief scorers and the best batsmen but the return match was lost through the absence of Mr. Rup Chand Dafadar, the Games Master, "whose hard bowling always created a panic in the hearts of opponents". But the most interesting game of this period was "The Fancy Football Match" of 29th September 1916, played for half-an-hour between Third and Fourth Year classes which ended in a draw. "All the players who had played any match within a year were excluded".

The "Annual Sports" of the College was first held in 1909. It was merged in the "Durbar Day Sports" which were celebrated every year on the 12th December. In 1915, the Durbar Day celebrations, held on the 13th December in place of the 12th which was a Sunday, were marked by an excellent address by the Principal and followed by sports in which most of the Prizes were carried off by the College students including "the Baker Tug-of-War Cup".

It may be of interest to add that Physical Exercise had been made compulsory for students since 1912 and a fine of one anna was levied for every day of absence.

College discipline showed perceptible improvement between 1907—1912 "after the unfortunate and regrettable incivility" of students in previous years, and Principal Satish Chandra De went so far as to say in his Report that the students of his College were not only "loyal and law-abiding" but also co-operated with their Principal in making all public functions of the College a success.¹⁶ College discipline, however, was seriously affected in 1921 by the Non-co-operation Movement—so much so, that a number of students were expelled and the College had to be closed for nearly a month from the end of January up to the 20th February 1921. The situation, however, steadily improved until in 1923 the Principal could say in his report that there was no case of breach of discipline in the College or hostels.

In the earlier half of this period the life of the College was affected by the outbreak of the Great War in August 1914. Every opportunity was given to the students of Krishnagar College to join the Indian Army, and a meeting was held in the College Hall with the Collector in the chair. In 1917-18, Krishnagar College furnished a unit of more than fifty men in the Indian Defence Force which provides us with such familiar names as Babu Baidya Nath Dakshy, Mr. Rup Chand Dafadar, Babu Hemanta Kumar Sarkar and Maulvi S. M. Akbaruddin.¹⁷ Two other *ex*-students of the College—Arun Kumar Mitra of the Mitra Family of Krishnagar and Sambhu Charan Roy—joined the Bengali Double Company and were promoted to the rank of non-commissioned officers. On the conclusion of the war and the signing of the Armistice on the 11th November 1918, Krishnagar College yielded to none in observing the "Armistice Day" Celebrations. The College was illuminated. A year later on the 12th December 1919, the Peace Celebrations of the College were held with great éclat—when the institution was beflagged and the students and staff met in the College Hall. The College celebrated in 1918 another event, the Seventy-second Anniversary Day of the Foundation of Krishnagar College on the 1st January 1846 by a Cricket Match between the present and *ex*-students of the College.

The College was also graced on more than one occasion by the visit of His Excellency the Governor of Bengal—Sir Edward Norman Baker in 1910, Lord Carmichael in August 1915, Lord Ronaldshay in July 1920 and the Earl of Lytton in December 1923. Other high officials like the Maharaja of Burdwan visited the College in January 1920 and the Hon'ble Sir Hugh Stephenson, Member of the Executive Council, paid a visit in January 1925. Lord Carmichael held a Grand Durbar in the College Hall on the 31st August in 1915 in which a piece from the "Gita" was recited in his honour. The Earl of Lytton visited the Library and the College classes and granted a week's holiday. Both he and his predecessor Lord Ronaldshay were much impressed with the College Building and its excellent grounds and congratulated the Principal on the sustained success of the institution over which he presided. Their reports are recorded in the College Inspection Book in their own handwriting.

and these are followed by the note of the Maharaja Bahadur Kaunish Chandra Roy of Nadia, Executive Councillor, in his own hand, dated 1st September 1924.

The College was also visited by two members of the Sadler Commission—Professor Gregory and Ramsay Muir—in December 1917, when representative gentlemen of the town urged on them the need of affiliations in a larger number of subjects and a bigger staff strength for this College.

The College in this period had many of the extra-academic activities of the present day but there was one of curious interest. This was "The Krishnagar College Pumping Club" formed in November 1915 by the students of the College who pumped up water from the College well for weekly wages and spent the income derived from it on some good cause.

The deaths of two distinguished Principals of the College occurred in this period. Babu Umesh Chandra Dutt died on the 8th July 1916 in his eighty-seventh year and Sir Lethbridge, C.I.E., Principal of Krishnagar College in 1874, died in England in 1919 at the age of seventy-nine. Another misfortune of Krishnagar and the College was the deadly scourge of malaria in the town in 1917-18 whose effect on College work was disastrous, since the majority of students were absent from their first Periodical examination owing to fever. It is no wonder that the Editor of the College Magazine wrote in this tone of pessimism—"The Sanitarium of an earlier day (Krishnagar) has turned into a hotbed of malaria. The effect of this has been painfully perceptible within the College Walls. Whenever we have cast our looks towards the corridor, they have been confronted by the unwelcome sight of quite a lot of pale, anaemic and emaciated figures." Despite the ravages of malaria in Nadia, Principal Egerton Smith had the boldness to reaffirm the usefulness of Krishnagar College in his concluding remarks of the Quinquennial Report of 1917—1922: "It is clear that the College is fulfilling a very useful function in the Nadia District. It provides for a large number of students who could not find means to study in Calcutta. Moreover a college of limited size which is compact and has its own grounds with a hostel near at hand and a Resident Principal—has many advantages over larger colleges in the heart of a great city and may well be expected to foster a healthier life among students, both in the physical and moral sense."

CHAPTER VI.

(1925—1945.)

We come now to the end of the period of our hundred years' survey of Krishnagar College. In these two decades, it has not materially altered its appearance except for the addition during 1938—1941 of a number of rooms on the western side of the main building. But all the same, it has kept pace with the times. The College laboratories and class-rooms are now fitted with electric lights and fans. The roads leading to the College from the main entrances are macadamized and students of both sexes share the new amenities of college life side by side. The Moslems have now an attractive hostel of their own, not far from the Hindu Hostel and within the College premises, while the girls have not only a separate Common Room but even a separate staircase. The roll strength of the College has gone up beyond all expectations. As compared with one hundred students in 1908, the number is now more than four and a half times as much and the roll strength of the College on the 31st March 1942 was 439 with twenty-six girl students. In 1945 it rose to 450 with forty-six girl students.

This rise in the roll strength of the College has been mainly due to the new affiliations which it obtained during the Quinquennium (1937—1942)—Civics in I.A., Arabic in B.A. Pass, and Honours in Economics and Bengali. Krishnagar College enjoys the honour of being the first Government institution in Bengal with Honours affiliation in Bengali.

The University results have been very satisfactory in late years. The percentage of pass from Krishnagar College in the different University examinations was as high as seventy per cent. between 1932—1942. For three consecutive years (1939—1941), the B.Sc. result recorded a cent per cent pass and a good number obtained Second Class Honours in B.A. in different subjects. This satisfactory result was partly due to the system of "Tutorial supervision" prevailing in this College under which not only regular attendance at the tutorial classes is insisted on but marks are also allotted for tutorial work done in and outside the class-room. Every student of the College has to do an hour's tutorial work per week in each subject. The girl students of the College are not only gaining in numbers but are also showing good results in the University tests. In 1939 Miss Ashalata Modak was the first girl student of Nadia to obtain a Second Class Honours in Mathematics in B.A.

In the last twenty years the College has been fortunate in having a number of capable Principals—Mr. Egerton Smith from 1921—1928, Mr. A. K. Chanda from 1930—1931, Principal R. N. Sen from 1932—1934 and finally Rai Bahadur J. M. Sen, the present head who has been in charge of the institution since April 1937. Between the regimes of Principals R. N. Sen and J. M. Sen, Messrs. K. Ahmad, B.A. (Cantab.), and Bhabesh Chandra Banerjee, M.A. (for a short period only), filled up the vacancy of the Principalship of the College. Both Mr. Egerton Smith, M.A., and Principal A. K. Chanda, M.A. (Oxon.), had a difficult task in steering the College safely through the stormy waters of politics, as they were in charge of the institution when the Non-co-operation Movement and the Civil Disobedience Campaign in the country were in full swing and had their repercussions on the College. In February 1930 the "College Strike" following the hoisting of "The National Flag" on the Hostel building led Government to close down the institution for over a month. It was reopened in April of the same year. In order to divert the minds of students from outside political influence Principal Chanda aimed at developing the extra-academic life of the College and set up a College Union with most of the office-bearers elected by the students from amongst

themselves by ballot. To this "Union" the allied sections—Social, Literary (Study Circle), College Magazine, Common Room and Athletic—were affiliated and on this basis the Constitution of the College Union was drawn up in July 1937*, revised in April 1940 and amended in August 1944. Principal R. N. Sen, M.Sc. (Leeds), was one of the most popular figures of this period. His amiable manners, high sense of duty and genuine regard for the welfare of the institution won him the esteem of his students and colleagues alike. As Principal of this College, he worked whole-heartedly for raising the moral tone of the College and made a number of important changes. The Gymnasium was improved and Physical culture was actively encouraged. The Annual College Sports which is now a regular feature of the College life was revived. The "Old Boys' Reunion" as a link between the past and present students was started and finally the most daring experiment of "Co-education" was introduced. Had Principal R. N. Sen been alive today, he would have rejoiced at the success of his experiment and the sight of as many as forty girl students (in 1944) in the College thronging the lecture rooms and moving about with an air of freedom to which the half-a-dozen girls of his time could hardly aspire.

Last of all, came our present Principal Rai Bahadur J. M. Sen, M.Ed. (Leeds), who has been in charge of the College since 1937. When he came, he noticed that during the previous decade no affiliation in any new subject had been sought from the University and granted by Government. Under him, the College has undergone a steady expansion in the course of the last few years. The most noteworthy feature of his regime has been the extension of affiliations both in I.A. and B.A. Pass and Honours Courses, viz., Civics in I.A.; Arabic in I.A.; and B.A. Pass Course; Pass and Honours in Bengali; and Honours in Economics. The sanction of Government for teaching "Biology" as a subject in I.Sc. Course was also obtained; but the scheme could not be carried into effect as the Biological Laboratory Building could not be erected on account of the World War during the years 1942—1945. The new affiliations obtained since 1938 raised the roll strength of the College beyond all expectations. Between 1937—1942 the number went up from 326 to 439. The number further increased to over 450 between 1943 and 1945. The opening of additional sections in B.Sc. Pass Course by the appointment of two extra Laboratory Assistants in Physics and Chemistry has made also the "Science branch" popular and increased the roll strength on that side too. The wider range of affiliations together with the increased roll strength led to the raising of the staff strength of the College. It was twenty-one in 1937. In 1943 the number on the teaching staff rose to twenty-eight and Krishnagar College came to have the largest staff in Bengali among all Government Colleges of Bengal. Further, Principal J. M. Sen has sought to make higher education accessible to the poorer students of Nadia by greatly increasing the number of Government and endowed scholarships, free studentships and stipends. These are allotted among Nadia boys of all communities; and special stipends, at first tenable for one year but renewable for a second year, are also awarded to poor but deserving girl students of the College. One of his last acts for the benefit of poor and meritorious students of Krishnagar College was the launching of an appeal to his own friends and other well-wishers of the College for creating endowments for special scholarships, stipends and prizes in connection with the Centenary Celebration of the College held in January 1946. He has been able to collect (i) Rs. 17,100 in 3½ per cent. Government Promissory Notes and Rs. 36,850 in cash for further investments in 3½ per cent. Government Promissory Notes, the interest yield of which would be utilised in giving scholarships and stipends to the students of the College mostly for Science studies, and (ii) over Rs. 5,250 for investment in Government Promissory Notes, the interest of which would be utilised in awarding

special prizes and medals on the results of the University examinations of the students of the College with effect from 1946 (commencement of the second century of the College). All Government Promissory Notes aggregating a total face-value of Rs. 58,100—received direct from the donors or purchased at a premium from cash contributions made by the donors—have been made over to the Director of Public Instruction, Bengal, for obtaining orders of Government for creating Trust funds for the above purposes for the benefit of the students of Krishnagar College. Since January 1946, he has been able to raise further sums and the Centenary Endowment Funds stand at a figure of over Rs. 60,000 in Government Promissory Notes.

Lastly, one interesting feature of his regime was the thorough "Medical Test" of all Krishnagar College students in November 1941 by the Medical Board attached to "The Students' Welfare Committee." It was revealed that almost half the number of students were suffering from defects which required immediate attention and nearly one-third of the number had defective eye-sight. This is indeed a sad but true picture of the younger generation of Bengal whom we are attempting to overnourish mentally at the cost of their health.

The College staff came to have numerous changes during the period under review which cannot be welcome in an academic institution. Between 1932—1937, eleven out of twenty-two members of the staff left the College. By the end of 1944, it came to lose through retirement the services of a number of teachers like—

- (1) Professor Bhabesh Chandra Banerjee, M.A. (who also acted for a few months as Principal in 1936),
- (2) Professor Manmatha Nath Mukherjee, M.A.,
- (3) Professor Bidhu Bhusan Sengupta, M.A.,
- (4) Professor Prosad Chandra Banerjee, B.Sc. (London),
- (5) Professor Manindra Nath Mitra, M.A.,
- (6) Professor Banku Behari Pandit, M.A.,
- (7) Professor Narendra Nath Chatterjee, M.A. (*ex-Vice-Principal*),
- (8) Professor Ramendra Nath Ghosh, M.A., and
- (9) Professor Satya Saran Kahali, M.A.

—men who had given the best part of their life and service to Krishnagar College. Many of them have served her for more than two decades and Krishnagar owes them a debt of gratitude for the manner in which they have educated her sons and fitted them for their civic duties. On the side of Physical culture, the College has reasons to be proud of the services of Babu Rup Chand Dafadar, the Physical Instructor, who has been in charge of college games since 1919 and has looked after the health and well-being of the students for a quarter of a century with the same energy and friendliness which he shows today. He retires in 1946.

In terms of the Regulations framed by the University of Calcutta and approved by Government under the Indian Universities Act of 1904, all colleges (including Government colleges) were required to have Governing Bodies of their own. Government of Bengal accordingly constituted separate Governing Bodies for colleges maintained by them with well defined powers for different colleges. So far as Krishnagar College was concerned, the Governing Body had the District Judge of Nadia as its *ex-officio* President for nearly thirty-five years. This long connection of the District Judge of Nadia with the management of the College was broken at the end of 1944, and the District Magistrate was appointed as the *ex-officio* President of the Governing Body of the College from the beginning of 1945. The term of office of the Governing Body of the College is for three years and it is periodically reconstituted by Government. Besides the President and the Principal (who is *ex-officio* Vice-President and Secretary) and two elected

representatives of the teaching staff, there were seven non-official gentlemen (viz., three Hindus, three Muslims and one Christian) on the Governing Body of the College as constituted by Government in 1945. The services of the past presidents (namely, the successive District Judges of Nadia) are to be gratefully remembered for all that they did for the College for a period of nearly thirty-five years; the services rendered by the non-official members of the Governing Body also deserve equal recognition.

The total direct expenditure of the College for 1941-1942 was Rs. 1,18,643-3 as against Rs. 1,08,363-9-2 in 1936-1937. The annual average cost of educating each student in 1936-1937 was Rs. 356, but five years later it came down to Rs. 296. This was possible owing to the increased roll strength of the College. Compared with the above figures, the total expenditure of the College in 1878 with a roll strength of 105 was Rs. 24,112-2 and in 1893 Rs. 33,590-12-7 only. It will thus be evident that the College expenditure of the year has gone up more than four times since 1878. As the roll strength has also quadrupled since 1878, the education cost *per capita* has really shown no rise and is, in fact, lower (Rs. 296) than what it was in 1878 (Rs. 306); and not even the whole of this expenditure was met by Government. Despite this improved financial position, Government was unduly anxious in 1938 to put forward a definite proposal for the deprovincialisation of Krishnagar College and effect a net saving of only about Rs. 65,000 per year. Principal J. M. Sen made out a strong case for retention of the College as a Government Institution both on financial and administrative grounds. He contended that both financially and administratively a local Governing Body would be unable to run the college either smoothly or efficiently by shouldering financial and other responsibilities. His arguments in favour of the *status quo* of the College induced the Government of Bengal finally to abandon the proposal of deprovincialisation of Krishnagar College.

The College library has had some addition of books in the last decade but owing to the reduction of the library grant from Rs. 2,000 in 1931-1932 to Rs. 750 during the Quinquennium of 1937-1942, the library could not be brought up-to-date in many of the subjects. Only a few particular subjects which were introduced in the College under new affiliations like Civics, Arabic, Bengali and Economics Honours received special grants in the period under review. In the course of the last quinquennium (1937-1942) nearly a thousand books were added to the College library and the total number of books up to 31st March 1942 was 16,468. Babu Nagendra Nath Choudhuri, B.A., has been in charge of the library since 1914. The College has reasons to be grateful to him for his long and devoted service. The Catalogue of the library was last revised in 1935-1936. His Excellency the Governor Lord Ronaldshay in the course of his visit to the College in July 1920 thus spoke of the library—“It is a large one and contains an interesting collection of books.” There are really some old and precious books in the library, though many of them are in a bad state of preservation. The History section has an interesting collection. In European branch there are books like—

The appearance of the library is still unsatisfactory in many ways. Partitioned by a wooden screen on one side and narrowed by the Girls' Common Room on the other, the library looks rather like a prison house where its readers can hardly feel any ennobling influence. Every part of it is cramped for space and the whole atmosphere is one of utter congestion. The librarian sits in one corner of the room—subject to the constant sieges of students for books. There is no reading room in the library for members of the staff as the one available is often used for small classes and tutorial

work. The serene atmosphere required for serious study hardly exists and one of the most urgent needs of the College is greater accommodation for the library with better arrangement for its readers.

The College laboratory has been greatly improved in recent years. It is now provided with electric lights, fans and better water-supply arrangements. For the purpose of scientific experiments, a motor generating set with converter for changing alternating to direct current has been installed. An additional lecture room and a dynamo room have been built in the quinquennium of 1937—1942. All this has enabled the College to admit a larger number of science students than in previous years. But the improvement of the laboratories has, to some extent, been affected by the reduction of the laboratory grant from Rs. 2,750 to less than Rs. 2,000 since 1932. An additional recurring grant of Rs. 500 per annum has been sanctioned since 1942, when additional sections in the B.Sc. classes were opened. Even this additional grant has been inadequate for the growing needs of the College. A laboratory grant of at least Rs. 6,000 at an early date would be welcome and we hope that with the growing popularity of the Science course, Krishnagar College will not only have Biology in I.Sc. in the near future but also Honours in Physics and Chemistry.

In this connection, mention should be made of the establishment of a Meteorological Observatory at the College in June 1932. Babu Suresh Chandra Dhar, M.Sc., Laboratory Assistant in Physics, served as the Observer till November 1934. Since then, Babu Nagendra Nath Choudhuri, B.A. (Librarian), has been doing the work of the Observer. His work during the last eleven years has been uniformly satisfactory. The Director-General of Observatories, India, reported that Nagen Babu's work was good in 1938, very good in 1935, 1936, 1937, 1939, 1941 and 1942, and excellent in 1940, 1943 and 1944. Further improvement of the College Observatory is possible as a post-war measure of development of Meteorological stations.

The Hindu Hostel has upheld its good name under the supervision of Professor Binayak Sanyal, M.A., who has been in charge of the boarders for more than a decade (since 1934). It is very popular and has maintained on the average a roll strength of 40 or more boarders. It has developed a corporate life of its own and organised successful "socials and plays" which have been always appreciated by the staff and students of the College.

The Muhammadan Hostel, which was formally opened by Sir Azizul Haque, the Education Minister of Bengal, on the 25th July 1936, has been now named "The Anderson Moslem Hotel" with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor of Bengal, Sir John Anderson. It has accommodation for sixteen boarders with four rooms and is a one-storeyed building on the western side of the College. The Head Maulvi of the Collegiate School is in charge of the Moslem boarders and the Sub-Assistant Surgeon of the Sadar Hospital is the medical officer of both the hostels. The Moslem Hostel suffers from inadequate accommodation and inadequate water-supply with no bathrooms and no extra rooms for any corporate activities. These defects need the early attention of Government and we hope that the recent donation of Rs. 10,000 received from Haji Eusop Jan of Halsa will be usefully employed for removal of the drawbacks of the hostel.

This period has been equally noteworthy for the development of the extra-academic life of the College in all its phases. The College Union was completely reorganised at the end of 1930 with a Constitution which was recast in July 1937 and amended in April 1940 and August 1944. Under it, the office-bearers were elected by the students by the ballot system. In 1933, the College Union elections were severely contested by candidates of different parties when many leaflets of various colours were distributed among the students and brisk canvassing for votes went on up to the moment of the actual ballot. The Election Day has been a unique day for the College every year with the brisk canvassing campaign of students going on from

morning till the hour of the ballot—and great have been the rejoicings of successful candidates who have celebrated their triumphs from time to time by the offer of sumptuous tea and refreshment to their supporters. Under the general supervision of the "Union", the student-secretaries of its various sections—Social, Athletic, Common room and Magazine—have continued their activities with great vigour. Debating, Essay and Recitation Competitions have been held every year under the auspices of the "Union". Distinguished public men have been invited to address the College students and in the quinquennium of 1937—1942, several outstanding men of Bengal like Dr. Syama Prosad Mukherjee and Sir Azizul Haque, the two *ex*-Vice-Chancellors of the Calcutta University, the late Babu Ramananda Chatterjee, the well-known Journalist, Mr. Pramatha Choudhury, the well-known writer, and Babu Sisir Kumar Bhaduri (the famous actor) were the guests of honour at the Union. It has been a platform on which our students have been encouraged to speak on various subjects and gain early training in the art of debate. Various interesting subjects like—

- (1) Should attendance at the College lectures be compulsory?
- (2) The League of Nations as an instrument of Peace has been an utter failure,
- (3) Should Military Education be compulsory?
- (4) India's contribution to World Civilisation,

were discussed. Some of the girl students of the College also have taken part from time to time in these debates. In this connection it may be mentioned that outside political influence manifested itself, on more than one occasion, in the activities of the College Union during the last few years—particularly during the disturbances of August 1942. In September 1945, the non-Muslim students of the College made the allocation of seats of the office-bearers of the College Union as between Muslim and non-Muslim students of the College, the main issue of their agitation and organised a strike for a short period. The College was not closed but the non-Muslim students absented themselves from their classes for about nine days just before the Puja holidays in early October. In consequence, the Principal suspended the activities of the College Union temporarily towards the end of September 1945. The College, however, resumed its normal work when it reopened on the 19th November after the Vacation. Even as early as September 1927 the College Union, not so vocal as today, held a protest meeting in the College Hall, under the Chairmanship of Principal Egerton Smith, to condemn the indiscreet utterances of an English Member of Parliament Mr. George Pilcher, against the chastity of Indian widows and "*The Statesman*" for giving publicity to such a slanderous speech. There have been more than one "Poet's Day" under the auspices of the Union. The literary Society (known as the Study Circle) of the College organised one at the end of 1937 and another such function on the 11th March 1939. In this connection, the Secretary of the Study Circle wrote in the College Magazine—"We were rather nonplussed by the number of poets who insisted on regaling our poor ears with their sweet symphonies."

The Old Students' Reunion has been a great event in February almost every year with a crowded programme arranged by the Social and Amusements Section of the Union. It has included an exciting Cricket Match between the Old and New students followed by tea and refreshments in the afternoon and musical entertainment in the evening in which some of the "Old Boys" have also taken a prominent part. The first of these "Socials" was held in December 1931. In the February Social of 1938, our old and popular *ex*-students—Babu Kshitish Chandra Mukherjee and Babu Jyoti Bhushan Chatterjee, both respected members of the local Bar—took part in an interesting Cricket Match between the Old and Present students of the College, at the age of sixty and proved formidable by their underhand bowling.

The organisation of educational and other excursions has also been a feature of College life in this period. A group of College students went on a "Cycle trip" to "Santiniketan" in April 1935—where they had a group photo taken with the great poet in their midst. There were two Educational excursions also—the first for a batch of 45 students to "Tata Iron and Steel Works" at Jamshedpur under Dr. Subimal Ghosal of the Chemistry Department and the second was a historical trip to "Nalanda" in March 1938 under Professor T. N. Talukdar. Nearer home, a short rural survey of a typical Bengali village of Nadia was made by a few College students under the guidance of Principal J. M. Sen in 1939.

The students occasionally organised large-scale College picnics and one such picnic arranged on the other side of the river (Jalangi) with games and music and attended by more than fifty students and some members of the staff was a great success.

On the Athletic side too, the students of the College have shown equal vigour and enthusiasm. The extensive grounds of the College offer unique facilities to our students for games and sports. Though these have not been fully utilised by the general body of students, a large number have taken a lively interest in all College games—football, cricket, hockey, tennis, volley ball, basket ball—and played many matches with Home and foreign teams in "Football and Cricket". In the Krishnagar Football League the College team won the "A Division Trophy" in 1937 and 1942, and "The Khagendra Memorial Cup" in Hockey for two consecutive years (1940 and 1941) after defeating all the three formidable local teams—The Town Club, the Century Club and the Police. Since 1932 there has been an "Inter-class Football League Competition" every year and an annual record of the winners has been kept in the College Hall on a wooden tablet "to stimulate healthy rivalry in the game among students of the different classes of the College." The girl students also have taken part in some games and participated in a "Badminton tournament" of their own every year. The "Physical Culture Section" of the College has been very active and Gymnastics appears to be popular with our students who have organised a special function for many years to give a display of their physical feats. There is at present no pavilion on the College grounds and the absence of it has been a long-felt want on all ceremonial occasions like the Annual Athletic Sports, Cricket matches with outside teams, etc. Principal J. M. Sen conceived of a plan of erecting a pavilion on a platform raised seven feet and six inches above the ground level and a brick-built gallery with seating accommodation for nearly four hundred students and visitors. He consulted the Executive Engineer and has matured the scheme which will cost nearly ten thousand rupees. The President of the Governing Body (Mr. A. M. Nasiruddin, District Magistrate, Nadia) is taking a keen interest in the scheme and the work of construction of the pavilion (including gallery) has been entrusted by him to a firm of contractors. If the construction be completed by the end of December 1945, the formal opening ceremony of the pavilion can be held in January 1946, in connection with the Centenary Celebrations of the College.

The College Common Room has been popular and active. It has served a real need of the students seeking recreation out of College hours by providing them with a small library of their own and various indoor games such as Table Tennis, Carom and Chess.

The College Magazine in spite of printing difficulties kept up its two issues of the year with interesting articles from teachers and students in both English and Bengali till the end of the academic session 1943-1944. The publication of the College Magazine remained suspended for two years, viz., 1944-1945 and 1945-1946, on account of printing difficulties and paper control order due to the War. As the War has ended, it is hoped that the paper control order of Government will be sufficiently relaxed to enable

the College authorities to undertake republication of the magazine with effect from 1946-47 (viz., the commencement of the second century of the work of the College).

In February 1930, political trouble broke out in Krishnagar College in connection with the Civil Disobedience Movement which led to the closing of the College for more than a month. Since then, the reports of successive Principals show that the College has been generally free from all political disturbances and has even carried on its normal life in the days of the "Terrorist Movement" in Bengal. But it is to be regretted that a certain section of students has in recent years failed to show that regard for discipline in their college life which one expects of them. Greater effort on their part to imbibe the really good traits of College education—such as punctuality, regularity of habits, cultivation of good manners and a sense of discipline with a genuine regard for the institution and its staff as well as the proper use of all educational facilities of the College—would have enabled them to reap the benefits of higher education much more profitably than at present. The true end of education is often overlooked by a large number of students here as elsewhere—who look upon the acquisition of "Degrees" by their usual short cuts to success as the sole justification of their study at the College for a number of years. There is no doubt that the poor market value of "Present Day Degrees" is to be partially blamed for this intellectual decline of students in general but that should be no excuse for true Educationists to sit idle and refrain from undertaking useful reforms for a better system of education. The making of a new order of youths—strong in physique, well disciplined, hardworking and intellectually broad-minded—ought to be their aim. It is a matter of deep concern to the educational authorities to have to deal every year with a number of cases of students who attempt to pass their University examinations, not by honest work but by the most unfair means. All students should bear in mind that such conduct brings disgrace as much on themselves as on their teachers and the institution to which they belong.

Co-education—introduced in many colleges of Bengal in recent years including Krishnagar College—has not perhaps had a salutary effect on the general tone of education in the province. In the opinion of many co-education of boys and girls at the age of sixteen or seventeen, without the sobering influence of a healthy social contact between pupils of both sex, in earlier years is a dangerous practice which should not be further encouraged. They think that this system has not been much of a success and in institutions where it exists, it has only created additional administrative difficulties for their Principal and staff. Sometimes the normal relations between the boys and girls of such colleges as fellow students worthy of equal respect, have been marred by unseemly conduct on the part of individual boys. But it is difficult to see how with the growing demand for higher education among girls in Bengal, Krishnagar College could have denied, to the girls of Nadia, the benefits of higher education.

Let us conclude with a word of tribute to the memory of a few distinguished members of the College who were connected with it as Principals or teachers or students and have already left this world. The names of them are given below:—

Captain D. L. Richardson, Messrs. R. Lethbridge, U. C. Datta Gupta, F. J. Rowe, Nilkanta Mozoomdar, Satish Chandra De, and Rajendra Nath Sen; Pandits Satish Chandra Vidyabhusan and Janakinath Bhattacharyya; and Messrs. Rabindra Narayan Ghosh, Ramapada Mozoomdar and Santosh Kumar Chatterjee. Amongst the old students of the College, the most illustrious were Mr. Rajkristo Mukherjee, a well-known writer, Mr. P. N. Bose, the well-known Scientist, Mr. Aswini Kumar Dutt, a political leader of the "Anti-Partition Days" in Bengal, Mr. Lal Mohan Ghosh, an eminent

Bar.-at-Law and Mr. D. L. Roy, the poet. All of them were men who put the stamp of their personality on the College and strove to uphold its good name.

There were many others whose names could not be included in this chapter but whose silent influence would be felt on the occasion of the Centenary Celebration of the College. The present members of Krishnagar College, both teachers and students, on the occasion of her Centenary, will not only cherish their memory but will also take this opportunity of saluting the countless "unnamed students and teachers" of this institution who have passed through her lofty portals and striven nobly for the cause of education. May their shining example ever stimulate the youths of Krishnagar College in years to come and make them worthy of their heritage.

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PREFACE

It is rather too late in the day to speak of the utility of a College Register. Every educational institution with a past should have a record of its activities—the activities of the staff as well as the students. In the West educational institutions to whom age has given dignity have their own Registers. In this Province Presidency College showed the way which was soon followed by Hughli College. It is quite in the fitness of things that Krishnagar College, which is about to celebrate its Centenary, should place before the public a record of its achievements during the last one hundred years. It has produced men of whom Bengal may well be proud and of whom at least some may claim to be regarded as great Indians.

We could not take what is generally considered to be the very first step in the compilation of a College Register, viz., the issue of appeals through the Press to old students or their descendants. Owing to war-time restrictions on paper and printing materials there was an element of uncertainty about the publication, and we proceeded quietly with our own resources. Besides, from our knowledge of the experience of Presidency and Hughli Colleges we did not feel enthusiastic enough to issue appeals. The response to such appeals in the former case was not sufficient while in the latter it was positively disappointing. We decided, therefore, to fall back on such works of reference as were ready to hand.

We have consulted General Reports on Public Instruction in the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency, Letters from the Secretary to Local Committee of Public Instruction to the Secretary to the Council of Education, University Calendars, Civil Lists, Histories of Services, Directories and Year Books. A study of Biographical sketches and Memoirs by contemporaries has been brought to bear upon the task. The Registers of Presidency and Hughli Colleges have also been of immense help.

The absence of Admission and Attendance Registers for some periods has created gaps in the records, and we have been compelled to confine ourselves mostly to students who actually passed *some* examinations, held either by the Council of Education or by the University. The names of such students (with sketches of their career as available) have been divided into five groups—the first covering the period from 1846 to 1860, the second from 1861 to 1884, the third from 1885 to 1908, the fourth from 1909 to 1930, and the fifth from 1931 to 1945. The names under each of these groups have been arranged alphabetically. The periods represent more or less the well-defined stages in the evolution of educational policy in Bengal. The first period includes the Junior Scholarship, Senior Scholarship and Entrance Courses; the second opens with the institution of the First Arts Course; the third begins with the incorporation of Honours in the B.A. Course; and the fourth marks the separation of the Science Course from the Arts Course. From this point of view the fifth period appears to be superfluous. The explanation is simple. A very long period such as 1909—1945 does not easily admit of alphabetical arrangement. Besides the five groups mentioned we have an appendix which contains an interesting miscellany of names. Here will be found the names of some students who did not pass *any* examination but who were in the College or the School classes for some time in the 19th or the early 20th century and distinguished themselves in various walks of life. For obvious reasons this appendix cannot claim to be either complete or accurate. Here, more than anywhere else, fuller light on facts and greater accuracy of details will be welcome. To a long story of the students has been added a short story of the staff with a Succession List of Principals.

The Preface would be incomplete without a few acknowledgments. The idea of preparing a College Register in connection with the Centenary Celebrations of the College was Principal J. M. Sen's. It was he who set the ball rolling. Indeed, his unfailing interest in the matter has enlivened me in the grey monotony of compilation. I must acknowledge with thanks the help I have received from many old boys of the College who are in the town. They have directly furnished a lot of information. Their hints and suggestions about the sources to be tapped for information or the persons to be approached for verification have all proved to be of considerable indirect assistance. My thanks are especially due to Mr. Bhabeschandra Banerji, M.A.; sometime Principal, Krishnagar College, Mr. Dwijendranath Chatterji, B.A., Assistant Head Master, Chuadanga V. J. School (ex-student, Group III), and Mr. Nagendranath Chaudhuri, B.A., Librarian, Krishnagar College (ex-student, Group IV). I have very much appreciated their genuine interest in the Register and their generous assistance to make it an authentic chronicle. I am also grateful to some of my colleagues for sympathy, encouragement and co-operation.

The College Register is more than a history: it is a history of histories. For teachers and students have their own histories—histories of achievements, big or small. Some of these histories are closed, but others are being made every day. To piece together such histories in a single volume, to place the dead and the living side by side, is a difficult and delicate task. Errors of both omission and commission inevitably creep in. The entire responsibility for them is mine, and I am ready to be corrected by those who are better informed than myself. The hardest things are often the most beautiful, and full effort is full victory. The compiler will find the sum of his labour if the Register serves as a golden link between those who are gone, those who are with us, and those who are yet to come. The older generations may turn to these pages and gild their moments of dullness with a glimpse of the days that are no more; the present and future generations may draw upon them for hope, faith, strength, and inspiration. A register growing musty in the dark corner of a dusty shelf is a sad commentary on the relationship between the *alumni* and their *Alma Mater*.
