Sir,

In submitting herewith the accompanying letter No. 4755, dated 19th March 1910, from the Director of Public Instruction, Bengal, containing certain proposals regarding acting arrangements in the Indian Educational Service staff of the Presidency College, I have the honour to state that there is no audit objection to the Director of Public Instruction's proposals, but the following points may be considered by Government:-

Since Mr. Harinath De is holding a distinct appointment under the Government of India, Dr. P.C. Roy may be declared to be acting in the appointment vacated by Mr. De. Further, if Mr. De's appointment has since been filled up the vacancy in which Dr. Roy continued to act may also be pointed out.

3. I would further observe that on 17th January 1910, the number of Indian Educational Service officers in the Presidency College rose to 9, and in terms of para:2 of the Director of Public Instruction's letter, Dr. Roy should revert from that date.

4. The Director, in his letter No.T/96, dated 6th May 1910, has informed me that Mr. Das Gupta's acting promotion should begin from the 10th April 1908 and not from 3rd April 1908.

Sir,

I have the honour to invite reference to Mr.

Milne's letter No.1869/T-G, dated 24th October 1908, communicating sanction to the appointment of certain professors of Presidency College belonging to the Provincial Educational Service to act in the Indian Educational Service in consequence of vacancies which existed in the college on or before 29th January 1908.

2. On 30th January 1908, the Indian Educational Service staff of the college consisted of the following officers:-

- (i) Mr. H. R. James.
- (ii) " C. Little.
- (iii) " H. M. Percival.
- (iv) " C. W. Peake.
- (v) " J. A. Cunningham.
- (vi) " E. P. Harrison.
- (vii) " J. R. Cunningham.
- (viii) " W. C. Wordsworth.

Until therefore the number of Indian Educational Service officers rose to 9, which is the number sanctioned for Presidency College, only the most senior professor of the Provincial Educational Service, namely, Dr. P. C. Roy could act in the Indian Educational Service according to the terms of Government letter No. 2851/T-G, dated 2nd October 1905, and this was sanctioned in terms of Mr. Milne's letter referred to.

3. The strength of the Indian Educational Service staff was temporarily reduced to 7 for the period from 21st February to 2nd March 1908 i.e. during the interval between the date on which Mr. Little went on combined leave and that on which Dr. C. E. Cullis assumed charge of his officiating appointment at Presidency College. The Indian Educational Service staff was again reduced to 7, when, on 10th April 1908, Mr. J. R. Cunningham was appointed to act as Assistant Director of Public Instruction, and the number did not rise beyond 7 until Mr. Peake returned from furlough on 13th December 1909. During these two periods, therefore, the second senior professor of the Provincial Educational Service, Mr. J. N. Das-Gupta would be eligible for acting promotion to the Indian Educational Service if a suitable absentee in that service could be specified for the whole of the two periods, as laid down in paragraph 3 of Government letter No. 2851-T/G, dated 2nd October 1905. I therefore recommend that Mr. Das-Gupta be appointed to act in the Indian Educational Service in the vacancy caused by Mr. Little's leave for the former period and in that caused by Mr. W. W. Hornell's retirement for the



the period from 3rd April to 11th June 1908. Orders sanctioning Mr. Das Gupta's acting promotion with effect from 12th June 1908 have already been communicated in Mr. Cumming's letter No. 1442, dated 10th March 1909, but the promotion should cease from 20th October 1909, on which date Mr. E. F. Oaten, Mr. Hornell's successor, joined the Indian Educational Service.

4. The number of Indian Educational Service officers at Presidency College fell to 6 when, on 23rd March 1909, Mr. James was appointed to act as Director of Public Instruction. The number did not rise beyond 6 until 20th October 1909, on which date Mr. Oaten joined Presidency College. For the period from 23rd March to 19th October 1909, therefore, Dr. D. N. Mullick, 3rd in point of seniority among the Provincial Educational Service professors, was eligible for acting promotion to the Indian Educational Service. I recommend that this promotion be given him in the vacancy caused by Mr. James's deputation.

5. The strength of the Indian Educational Service staff referred to was reduced to 5, when, on 24th March 1909, Mr. Peake availed himself of his combined leave. The staff did not become any stronger until Mr. T. S. Sterling joined Presidency College on 16th October 1909. For the period from March the 24th to October the 15th, therefore, Mr. Manomohan Ghose, 4th in point of seniority among the Provincial Educational Service professors, was eligible for acting promotion to the Indian Educational Service. I recommend that he be granted this promotion in the vacancy due to the absence, on leave, of Mr. C. W. Peake.

Sir,

With reference to your letter no. 4755, dated the 19th March 1910, which was received with the letter of the Accountant-General, Bengal, No. G.A. 1458, dated the 21st May 1910, I am directed to say that the following professors in the Presidency College, who are members of the Provincial Educational Service, will be considered to have acted or to be acting in temporary vacancies in the Indian Educational Service, as shown below, and to communicate sanction to the grant to them of the usual allowance at the rate of Rs. 100/- per mensem for the periods specified:-

- (1) Dr. Praphulla Chandra Ray, vice Mr. Hari Nath Das, appointed Librarian of the Imperial Library, Calcutta, with effect from the 30th January 1909 to the 16th January 1910, and again from the 23rd February 1910 till the vacancy is filled or until further orders;
- (2) Mr. Jogendra Nath Das Gupta vice Mr. C. Little, on leave, with effect from the 21st February 1909 to the 2nd March 1909 and vice Mr. W. W. Hornell, resigned with effect from the 10th April 1909 to the 11th June 1909;
- (3) Dr. Devendra Nath Mallik, vice H. R. James, on

deputation as Director of Public Instruction, with -- effect from the 23rd March 1909 to the 19th October 1909; and

(4) Mr. Manomohan Ghose, vice Mr. C. W. Peake on leave, with effect from the 24th March 1909 to the 15th October 1909.

2. The Accountant-General, Bengal, has been informed that Mr. Jogendra Nath Das Gupta, who was acting in the Indian Educational Service vice Mr. Hornell with effect from the 12th June 1909, under the orders communicated in this Department letter No. 1442, dated the 10th March 1909, ceased to act in that service from the 20th October 1909 as Mr. E. F. Oaten, who was recruited in Mr. Hornell's place, joined the Indian Educational Service on that date.

In our letter No. 2581 T.S. of the 2nd Oct. 1960 we accepted the proposal of the D.T.O. that if in any College the number of officers belonging to the I.E.S. falls short of the prescribed number the Senior Officer or officers, as the case may be, in that College who belong to the P.E.S. should, as a general rule, receive an allowance of Rs 100 a month until the number of Indian Service officers is again complete. But we pointed out that as the grant of the allowance in question was subject to the proviso that the salary of the acting incumbent should not be higher than the pay of the officer for whom he acts it was essential for audit purposes that the name of an absentee in the I.E.S. should be

Satisfied for every Acting Appointment which is made. We also stated that there was no such objection to an officer of the P.E.S in one College drawing the allowance for Acting in the place of an officer of the I.E.S who has proceeded on leave or deputation outside the I.E.S from another College.

2. The I.E.S in his letter no. 4755 of the 19th March 1910, which has been received through the A.G.B, recommends :-

(1) That Dr Prashanta Chandra Ray, Prof, Presidency College, should act in the I.E.S from the 30th January 1908 when the College ceased to have its full complement of Indian Service officers.

In G.O. no. 1869 T.S. of the 24th Oct 1908 Dr Ray was appointed to act in the I.E.S vice W. Hari Nath De. We do not know when he ceased to act and that is probably immaterial for present purposes. The A.G. suggests that if W. De's place should not have been filled up Dr Ray may be declared to be acting in his place. This may be done as we know from a recent letter of the Directors' we are writing to you about the recruitment of an officer.

Mr. James was on deputation outside that
Service. We may accept the proposal. The
A.G. has no objection.

The number of I.E.S. officers at Presidency College rose to 9 when, on 17th January 1910, Mr James reverted to the Principalship after his privilege leave. But the number has again fallen to 8 since Dr. Cullis went on furlough on 23rd February 1910.

I accordingly suggest that Dr. P.C. Ray should be reverted to the P.E.S. for the period from 17-1-10 to 22-2-10 but that he should be reappointed to act in the I.E.S. with effect from 23-2-10 in the appointment vacated by Mr. De, as before.
