In continuation of this office confidential circular No.20, dated the 2nd July 1930, on the subject of the submission of quarterly reports on the state of unrest in Government educational institutions, I have the honour to request that particular care should be taken (i) to submit your future reports in time and (ii) to deal in them fully (a) with the effect of political propaganda and excitement on academic discipline and (b) with the efforts made by individual members of your teaching staff to influence students and to guide them in their extra academic activities.

2. As I have been asked by Government to submit at frequent intervals in future figures showing the effect of the present agitation on Colleges and Government institutions I would request you to supply on the 16th instant a table showing the daily attendance in your College since the Government institutions under your charge reopened day after the Summer vacation up to and including the 15th instant. The present total roll number should be indicated, as well as the roll numbers on the opening day after the summer vacation in 1929, and on July 15th 1929. A similar report should be submitted each fortnight thereafter as long as the present unrest continues, unless your College any of the Government Institutions under your charge has remained on the whole unaffected.

Even in this case however, Government desires that in the event of the attendance on any day (owing to a hartal or any other political disturbance) falling below 66% of the roll number, Principals and Head Masters should immediately report that this has happened, with necessary explanation.
