Presidency College, the 4 August/74

Sir,  
I have the honor to report that Babu Nuffer Chander Pal Choudhuri Zemindar of Latoo dah  
Kishnaghur has generously placed at my disposal the sum of Rupees 4000/- for the purpose of  
providing the Presidency College with a really good Turret Clock and I beg that Government

will permit me to accept the Babu's handsome donation for carrying out this useful purpose. Not only will this clock meet an acknowledged want at the college but it will be a public benefit to the entire community in this part of the town and I would recommend that the thanks of government be awarded to the Babu for his liberal gift.

When I was in England last year I thought it probable that I should soon after my return to India meet with some Native gentleman whose liberality would enable me to place on the south front of the college building a suitable clock and I made enquiries as to the cost of a first class Turret clock packed and placed on board ship for Calcutta. This estimates are in my hand one for a clock with 5 feet copper dial and a 4 Cut bell for striking the hours and half hours only, the other for a similar clock as regard works but with additional bells for chiming the quarter hours. The cost of the first would be € 155/- and of the latter € 225/- free on boardship of course. I should very much prefer to have a clock striking the quarters but I am afraid that the cost of erecting a room for the clock and a Tower for the bells will be more than 2000/- Rupees. The executive engineer is now preparing an estimate of the cost of the alternatives and also a drawing to shew to effect on the south front and on receiving his estimate I shall be in a position to determine whether the cheaper or more expensive clock can be ordered. I beg that Government will permit me to London for the construction of the clock and also to make all the arrangements for insurance for and for the payments of the cost of the clock.
